Nitrate of soda applied at the rate of 100 pounds an acre increased his corn yield by 14.27 bushels an acre, and at 200 pounds an acre increased the corn yield by another 14.42 bushels, making 28.69 bushels over where none of the nitrate was used, reports J. O. Ellis of Elizabethtown to County Agent J. R. Powell.
 Using the extension service formula for tobacco fertilizer, O. P. Hiburn of Council, Bladen County, produced 1,288 pounds of leaf an acre and sold it for \$213.12. He used the fertilizer at the rate of 900 pounds an acre and says he will use the same formula next season.
