Louisburg College News Items

Students Hear Lecture
Mr. E. Joe Cheatham and Mr. Thurston J. Jackson, Telegraphic Operators of Franklinton, gave special illustrated discussions last Tuesday morning to the eighty-five office-practice students in the Business Department of the College concerning the latest developments of telegraphing. They demonstrated in a most interesting manner how the dots and dashes are given and deciphered. Mr. Jackson "sent" several telegrams from one part of the typing room to the other, while Mr. Cheatham interpreted and wrote them on the board. This was both entertaining and instructive to the class. Mr. Cheatham gave instructions as to how to write telegrams in the correct way. He showed samples of the various types of telegrams now being used, including a number of telegrams of greetings which may be sent anywhere in the United States for only twenty-five cents on holidays, birthdays, Valentine's Day, and other special occasions. Recently, certain inventions have made possible the sending of twenty messages on the same wire at the same time. Such rapid improvements naturally affect the service in such a way that many more telegrams may be sent at less expense. Mr. Cheatham said that now, because of the railroad pensions, there is a great demand for telegraphic operators. He impressed upon the students the fact that the telegraphic business is interesting, enjoyable, and well worth the work it requires. Mr. Cheatham and Mr. Jackson gave each of the students a cordial invitation to go to their office and see "just how it is worked."

Both the faculty and student body of Louisburg College appreciate the interest that Mr. Cheatham and Mr. Jackson have taken in the Office-Practice class and the educational instruction they have given it.

BUNN SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

The Fourth teachers' meeting of the Bunn School District was held in the Bunn High School at two o'clock on March 8, 1938.

The teachers first met in the auditorium where Mr. M. T. Lamm, Supervisor of the Bunn School District opened the meeting.

The teachers sang the Bolla song which was directed by Miss Faustina Shearon and prayer was offered by Mr. C. C. Brown, Principal of the Harris School.

Mr. Lamm appointed three teachers from the Bunn School District to go as delegates to the Annual State Convention which is held in Raleigh on March 16, 17, 18, and 19. These teachers were Misses Mildred Manning and Wilma Phillips and Mr. C. C. Brown.

Superintendent W. R. Mills gave an interesting account of his trip to the National Convention which was recently held in Atlantic City. Mr. Mills said there were approximately 12000 present at the convention and that the program was one of the best that he had ever had an opportunity of observing and it made him proud of the public school system of this country. There were more than 450 speeches and the main idea which ran through the program was "Democracy" the only real salvation for this country.

One speaker on the subject of "Education of teachers" brought out the fact that too many teachers are attending teachers colleges and trying to be teachers when they are really suited for something else and teachers' colleges should begin selecting their teachers and if it is found that they will not make acceptable teachers then they should be advised to follow other occupations to which they are suited.

Teachers need a large amount of academic training in addition to methods of teaching. Many teachers begin on methods before knowing the subject matter. The time will come when all the teacher training courses will be graduate courses.

Superintendent Mills complimented the teachers of the Bunn School District on the splendid work they are doing.

After this enjoyable and interesting talk, we went to the various Departmental meetings where several teachers from the different departments gave talks on the subject of "Teaching the Lesson" which was the main topic on the program.

The discussion period of the Primary Department was conducted by Supt. W. R. Mills and the Grammar Grade and High School Department which were held jointly was conducted by Mr. M. T. Lamm, Supervisor of the Bunn School District. These meetings are a source of inspiration to the teachers and it is always a pleasure to have Mr. Mills and Mr. Lamm present for they always give many suggestions which are helpful and encouraging to the teachers.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF FOUR THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$4,000.00) WATER AND ELECTRIC LIGHT BONDS.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Louisburg:

SECTION 1. That the Town of Louisburg issue its bonds pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act as amended for the purpose of making improvements to the water and electric light system in and for said town, the estimated cost of such improvements is not less than \$4,000.00.

SECTION 2. That the maximum aggregate principal amount of said bonds is \$4,000.00.

SECTION 3. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of said bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

SECTION 4. That a statement of the debt of the Town of Louisburg has been filed with the Clerk and is open to public inspection.

SECTION 5. That this ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after its first publication unless in the meantime a petition for its submission to the voters is filed under the Municipal Finance Act, in which event it shall take effect when approved by the voters of the town at an election as provided in said act.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 8th day of March, 1938, and was first published on the 11th day of March, 1938.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF TWENTY-FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$2,500.00) STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Louisburg:

SECTION 1. That the Town of Louisburg issue its bonds pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act as amended for the purpose of constructing or re-constructing the surface of streets or highways including contemporaneous construction or re-construction of sidewalks, curves, gutters or drains and grading in and for said town, the estimated cost of such improvements is not less than \$2,500.00, of which not less than one-fourth of the costs, exclusive of costs of paving, at street intersections, is to be specially assessed.

SECTION 2. That the maximum aggregate principal amount of said bonds is \$2,500.00.

SECTION 3. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of said bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

SECTION 4. That a statement of the debt of the Town of Louisburg has been filed with the Clerk and is open to public inspection.

SECTION 5. That this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and shall not be submitted to its voters.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 8th day of March, 1938, and was first published on the 11th day of March, 1938.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.
