

Pattern 8112—If you would look inches slimmer, choose pattern 8112, for your afternoon dress. The yoked skirt without belt and lifted high at the midriff creates a slenderizing silhouette, giving all emphasis to up-and-down lines. The V neckline edged in lace sets the dressy character of this style. The skirt flares very softly at hem and panel is repeated in back and front of skirt. For this dress choose black silk crepe or alpaca—a dull surface fabric that will emphasize slimmness of silhouette.

Patterns 8108 and 8115—The bias cut skirt and the smooth jumper are very flattering and give a grown-up look to this school classic. The bodice slimmness is emphasized by the blouse cut on soft, full lines and shirred at neck and sleeves.

In the pantry frock shown in pattern 8115, note the box pleats in hem of skirt and the angling sleeves. Choose a cotton print for these spring dresses.

Pattern 8112 is designed for sizes 36, 38, 40, 42, 44, 46, 48, 50 and 52. Size 38 requires 4 5-8 yards of 39-inch material with long sleeves and 5-8 yard of lace to trim the neck as pictured.

### Peter Levine Body Found

New Rochelle, N. Y., May 29.—The wire-bound body of long-missing Peter Levine—head, hands and feet missing—was found and identified by detectives tonight on the shore of the estate of Louis Iselin on Davenport Neck, Long Island sound.

The body was hardly more than a mass of decomposed flesh and a few bones, but Detectives Edwin Gleason and Michael Lynch said enough of the lad's clothing remained to make identification possible.

Helmer Strong, 47, a yacht captain employed by Mrs. Iselin, was standing on the shore when, he said, a due east wind blew the body landward and lodged it against a rock. He immediately spread the news and officers were on the scene in a short while.

The boy, son of Murray Levine, a Fifth Avenue, New York, attorney, disappeared from his home here February 24 after leaving school.

Almost immediately, the father received a note demanding \$50,000 ransom but payment of the money was never made.

### The Right Moves

Moves to correct abuses of tax exemptions on property in Raleigh arose on two fronts Saturday.

The Board of Directors of the Association of Wake County Taxpayers, Inc., adopted a resolution asking that Wake County authorities furnish a list of all tax exempt property to end that any evils might be remedied.

The Chamber of Commerce is studying the situation along another front. The Chamber estimates that at least \$1,600,000 worth of real estate is tax exempt in Raleigh.

The resolution was sent to the Board of Commissioners of Wake County and to the Tax Supervisor by Graham M. Connell, president of the tax payers' group.—Raleigh Times.
