an excellent time to do terrace maintenance. Heavy rains during the past cultivating season caused considerable silting of terraces on clean-tilled fields, Mr. Mohler said.

Plowing of terrace channels in the spring and fall can be done with a turning plow as the land is prepared for crops. Where breaks have occurred these should be repaired with drag pan and shovel.

Where terrace ends have silted up, it is highly important that they be opened to permit water to flow freely out of the channel and prevent overtopping, Mr. Mohler added.
