ASSIST COUNTY OFFICIALS

Raleigh, Oct. 19.—The Brewers and North Carolina Beer Distributors Committee will assist county officials in checking their retail beer licenses to make certain that all dealers licensed by the state have paid their county fees.

State Director, Edgar H. Bain, announced today that each county board of commissioners will be furnished with a list of the names and addresses of all persons and firms licensed by the state to sell beer at retail in that particular county.

The committee has secured a complete list of all state licensed retail beer dealers from the N. C. Department of Revenue, Colonel Bain said. The names will be grouped by counties, and each county will be furnished with its own list.

According to Colonel Bain, these lists will enable the county officials to check the state list against their own lists and find out the names of any local beer outlets which have not paid their local license fees.

"Some North Carolina counties are not getting all the revenue they should from beer license fees," the state director reminded, "because of the failure of

some beer retailers to obtain county licenses or to renew such licenses upon expiration. "We believe that our plan to furnish the county with lists of persons and firms licensed by the state will aid them in collecting many additional license fees. We do not want beer sold by outlets that are not complying strictly with the law."

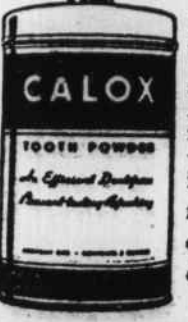
