Commissioners OK Surplus Food Plan

The Board of County Co missioners Monday approved the free distribution of surplus foods under the Commodity Distribution program to needy families in Franklin County for a period of 120 days beginning January 1.

Only those families certified as needy by the County Welfare Department will be eligible to receive the surplus foods. Items to be distributed under the program include dried staples such as flour, rice and beans, cheese, canned meats, powdered milk and etc. There are ten items in all that will be made available. Arrangements have been made

between the County and the Seaboard Air Line Railway for warehousing the foods at the S. A. L. Depot here and J. E. (Sue) Perry has been named Warehouse Supervisor.


