

For Celebration Players Select Hamlet

The world's most popular play, HAMLET, has been selected for production by the Louisburg Players April 23, 24, and 25 in celebration of the 400th anniversary of the birth of Shakespeare.

Traditional date for the Bard's birth is April 23, 1564. The glover's son went from Stratford to London to become actor, part-owner, and playwright with a theatre called the Globe. Today around the globe celebrations are being held in his honor. Year after year more Shakespearean plays are presented than those of any other author. Some have called him the world's greatest writer; audience figures show that he is the world's most popular playwright. The most exciting of his plays, HAMLET, has been seen by more people than any other play and is considered by some to be the world's greatest play.

Included in the cast for the Louisburg Players' production are Bill Williamson as Hamlet, David Daniel as Claudius, Nancy Berger as Gertrude, Jean Jones as Ophelia, Fred Cook as Polonius and Sexton, Mark Handler as Horatio, and Ken Barnes as Laertes.
