That friendly American invitation for pie and coffee calls for "Cheese Crust Velvet Pie," a luscious new treat. The chiffon type filling is a flavor blend of zingy lemon and subtle apple, and the secret of success is the rich cheese crust. It's made of crushed inch-square cheese crackers mixed with sugar and spicy cinnamon--so simple, yet so elegant. For a perky finish, border the pie with additional crackers standing on end. Here's how to make the pie of the season;

Cheese Crust Velvet Pie

1/4 cups fine Sunshine Cheeze-It Cracker crumbs 3 tablespoons sugar

1/2 teaspoon cinnamon 6 tablespoons melted butter or margarine

Whole Sunshine Cheez-It Crackers

2/3 cup apple juice 1 pkg, lemon flavored gelatin dessert, 3

1 can apple sauce, 81/2 ounces 1 cup heavy cream

Crush crackers, between waxed paper, with rolling pin into ine crumbs (or, crush in electric blender); mix with sugar and Add melted butter or margarine and blend well. Press mixture firmly over bottom and sides of 9-inch pie plate, bringing crumbs evenly up to rim. Press whole crackers around top side to make pointed edge. Refrigerate about 1 hour. Bring apple juice to boiling point, remove from heat, add gelatin dessert and stir until dissolved. Stir in apple Chill, stirring occasionally, until quite thick but not "set." Whip cream until quite thick and fold gently into apple mixture. Pour into chilled shell; refrigerate until firm. Decorate center with whole crackers. Yield: '6 to 8 wedges. (If you are in a hurry, chill the mixture in a bowl of ic
