

Luebeck Choir Of Germany Premieres Monday

Twenty-four European singers under the direction of Dr. Lebrecht Klops from Luebeck, Germany, will arrive in Louisburg, October 19, for the premier concert of their 1964 American Concert tour, in the College Auditorium at 8:00 p.m.

The program will provide the audience with classical, sacred, and folk music sung in Latin, German, French, Swedish, Korean, Finnish, Hungarian, and English. All foreign songs will be interpreted by a narrator.

The Luebeck Choir, organized fifteen years ago, has toured every European country and last year toured Canada and the United States for their first North American visit. The current tour, beginning at Louisburg, will take them to a number of North Carolina colleges, then north, and into Canada. Last year the Toronto newspaper, The Telegram, reported that the Luebeck Choir sang "radiantly together, these immaculately trained voices whose harmonies are so subtle and who can as occasion requires build up an impressive-

ly strong vocal fabric. Enunciation was consistently clear as crystal." The concert is the second in a series for the 1964-65 season of the Louisburg College Concert Series, and admits only concert patrons with season memberships. An informal reception after the concert will be held in the nearby Fine Arts Center.
