Election Brings Out 56% Registered Voters

The official vote count for last Tuesday's General Elections was set at 6,638 by the Board of Elections. This number fell short of the record 6,789 cast in the Democratic Primary last The balloting last week topped the 6,371 votes cast in the second Primary in June.

The county had 56.13% of those registered, voting, leaving 5,189 eligible to vote, that did not cast their ballots. The total registration in the county was reported officially as .11,827 last week by the Board of Elections.


