Special for the Holidays

As the holidays approach, pumpkin pie is again on the menu. If the rest of your menu requires oven time, you'll love this no-bake filling in a baked pie shell. Just a few minutes for the pie crust made from the mix and you can leave the oven to the turkey.
A pumpkin chiffon pie is such a pleasant change... it's so light and delicious that your guests will most certainly find room for it after the big meal. The fluffy filling nestled in tender and flaky pie crust will bring rounds of applause for the hostess... you!

PUMPKIN CHIFFON PIE Makes one 9-inch pie	1 cup firmly-packed brown sugar
One-half 10-oz. pkg. (1 cup) Flako Pie Crust Mix	1-1/2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice
2 tablespoons cold water	1-1/4 cups cooked pumpkin
1 envelope (1 Tbsp.) unflavored gelatine	2 egg yolks
1-1/2 cups milk	2 egg whites
	Dash salt

For crust, follow package directions for making a single crust 9-inch pie. Bake in preheated hot oven (425 degrees F.) 10 to 12 minutes. Cool.
For filling, soften gelatine in milk in saucepan. Stir in 3/4 cup of the sugar, pumpkin pie spice and pumpkin. Cook over medium heat until mixture boils, about 5 minutes. Add small amount of hot mixture to slightly beaten egg yolks; add to pumpkin. Cook an additional 3 minutes, stirring frequently. Cool. Beat egg whites and salt together until foamy. Add remaining 1/4 cup brown sugar, a tablespoon at a time, beating until meringue is stiff and glossy. Fold pumpkin mixture into meringue. Pour into baked shell. Refrigerate until set. Garnish with sliced toasted almonds.
