> PUMPKIN CHIFFON PIE Makes one 9-inch pie

One-half 10-oz. pkg. (1 cup) Flako Pie Crust Mix 2 tablespoons cold water

1 cup firmly-packed brown sugar

1-1/2 teaspoons pumpkin pie

1 envelope (1 Tbsp.) uhflavored gelatine

spice 1-1/4 cups cooked pumpkin 2 egg yolks

1-1/2 cups milk 2 egg whites Dash salt

For crust, follow package directions for making a single crust 9-inch pie. Bake in preheated hot oven (425 degrees F.) 10 to 12

minutes. Cool. For filling, soften gelatine in milk in saucepan. Stir in 3/4 cup of the sugar, pumpkin ple spice and pumpkin. Cook over medium heat until mixture boils, about 5 minutes. Add small amount of hot mixture to slightly beaten egg yolks; add to pumpkin. Cook an additional 3 minutes, stirring frequently. Cool. Beat egg whites and salt together until foamy. Add remaining 1/4 cup brown sugar, a tablespoon at a time, beating until meringue is stiff and glossy. Fold pumpkin mixture into meringue. Pour into baked shell. Refrigerate until set. Garnish with sliced toasted almonds.
