

## Advises Strawberry Planting Now

Mrs. Jewel Fisher, the Home Food Supply leader for Cedar Rock Home Demonstration Club, at the November 24th meeting reported that now, or until next March is a good time to set out strawberry plants. She recommended that certified, disease-free plants be used and that a variety be selected that would be marketable. She added that there was a possibility that there might be a shortage of commercial berries next year and that extra strawberries could well be a source of extra income as well as increasing the home food supply.

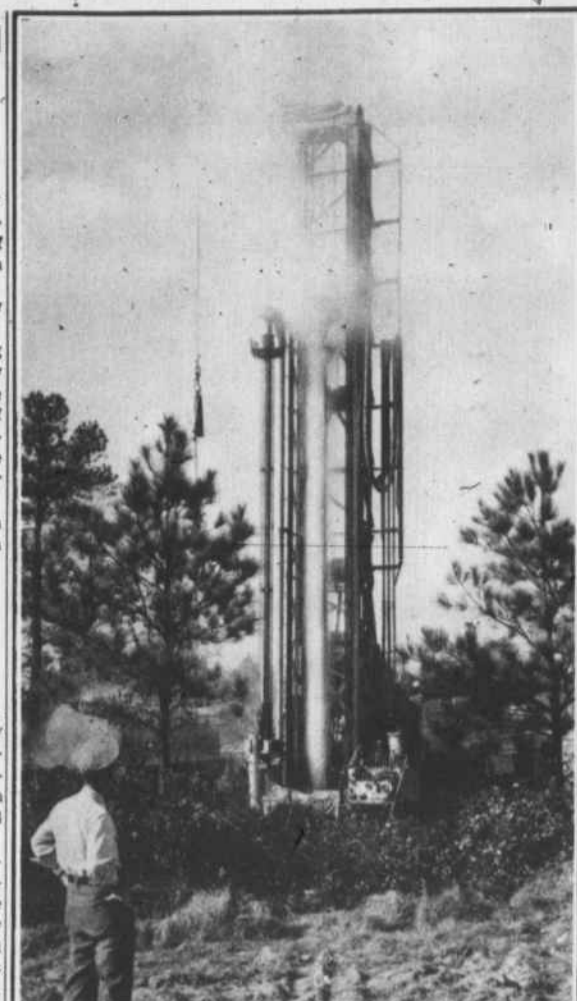

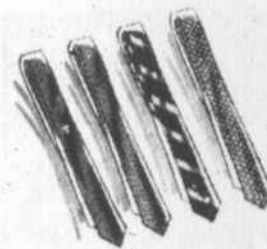

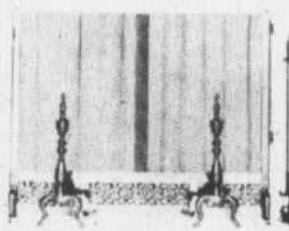
