

To Episcopal Women Sewanee Slides Shown

A description and condensed history of Sewanee, The University of the South, was presented through the use of slides and script by Mrs. Douglas House, Secretary of Christian Education, to the women of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Monday evening at 7:30 at the parish house.

This being the alma mater of the present rector, the members were especially interested in learning little-known facts about this outstanding university whose domain comprises around 10,000 acres atop the Cumberland Plateau in Tennessee, 2,000 feet above sea level.

It is said that Fulbright and Rhodes scholarships and Woodrow Wilson fellowships have gone more consistently to Sewanee men than to the graduates of any other school in the south. A Ford-sponsored study rated this university eighteenth among eighteen hundred collegiate institutions in the United States.

Other interesting facts about Sewanee are the following: The school is made up of three divisions (1) The College of Arts and Sciences, (2) The Theological Division, and (3) A Military Prep School; forty-eight bishops have come from Sewanee; the principal founder of this institution was Leonidas K. Polk, bishop in the Episcopal Church and lieutenant general in the Confederate Army, who was born in Raleigh and was directly connected with the Hawkins families in Warren and Franklin Counties.
