Dr. Wilkinson said, in the course of his remarks, that in a five-year period his institution -- by order of its board of trustees--had turned down \$3,750,000 on federal grants

"Easy federal money," he said, "will encourage the inmanagement and shocking lack of utilization of our existing educational facili-


