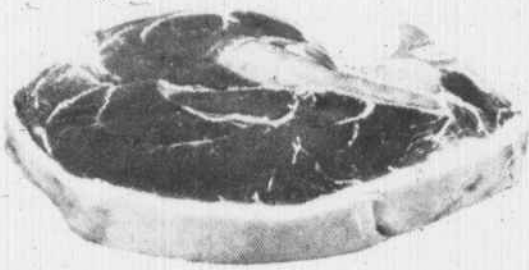
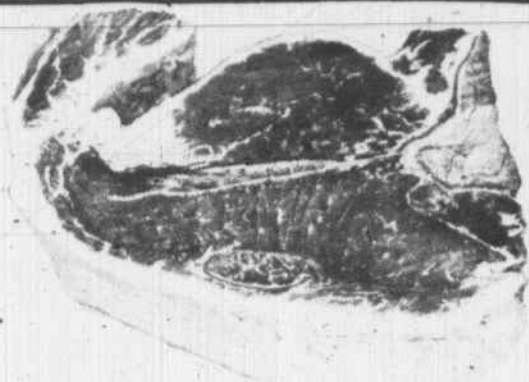
A dog show is a huge elimination contest. It may be a one- or two-day event which opens with several thousand dogs and ends with just one as a final Best in Show winner.

There are certain other con-cepts within the major one-taking place in every dog show. These may be the winning of blue ribbons, the winning of cham-pionship points, and Best of Breed and Best of Group honors and awards.

A dog show is for purebred dogs only. However, purebred dogs which are not registered can be shown a few times as "listed."

While dog shows are some-times referred to as "canine beauty contests" there is much more than just surface beauty to consider. One hundred and fifteen breeds of dogs are recognized officially by the American Kennel Club. Each of these breeds has its own "standard of perfection," which judges must know in order to evaluate the dogs being shown before them.

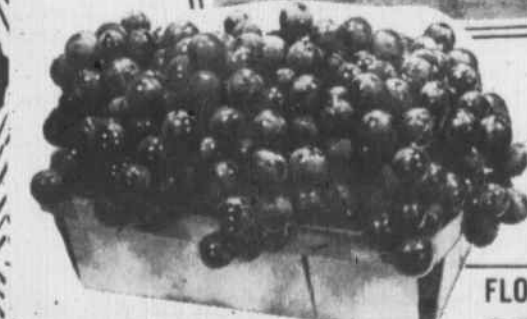
