Winter - 1917-18 Coldest recorded temperature in county (10 degrees below zero. Snow estimated at 6 inches. Drifts up to six feet. Worst ever recorded or remembered at that time.

Jan. 12, 1927

Coldest day since 1917-18. Estimated 6-inch snowfall.

March 3, 1927 Worst snow in history of area. 15-18 inches in county. 26 inches in other parts of state. Drifts to six feet.

Jan. 31 -

Feb. 1, 1948 Largest snowfall in forty years. Area received 13 inches: Came on heels of falling sleet and 5-degree temperature.

Jan. 7, 1958

Area received 11/2 to 2 inches. Temperature 6 degrees above zero.

Feb. 15, 1958

Snowfall not recorded. 6 degree temperature.

Dec. 11, 1958

Lowest temperature since 1917-18. Thermometer read 1 degree below zero. Area received 71/2 inches of snow.

Jan. 8, 1959

Fourth snow of winter. Area measured 31/2 inches on this date.

Mar. 5-6, 1959 Seven inches of snow fell in county.

1961-62-63-64 Snowfalls of 11/2 inches, largest of the period.

Jan. 16-17,1965 Area received 71/2 inches of snow.

Jan. 25-26-27, 1965

Eight inches of snowfall measured at Louisburg for third largest in history.




