Number Of County Grocers Get **Approval For Food Stamp Program**

Long lines of applicants have formed at the Welfare Office here for the past several days awaiting certification.

A large number of grocery operators received approval as Stamp stores here this week as interviews are completed by Mr. Sam Pope of Rocky Mount, official of the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture.

Based on the monthly income and the number of persons in a family, local citizens may receive bonus stamps when they purchase a certain amount of stamps for cash. The stamps may be used as cash in the purchase of food at any approved outlet. The merchant then may take the stamps to the local bank for deposit or to redeem for cash. The Board of County Commissioners estimated recently that the program will bring around \$200,000 annually into the local economy.
