College Golfers Place Eighth At Miami

MIAMI--Steve Eichstaedt, playing his home course, fired a 72 in the opening round of the National Junior College Golf Tournament here Tuesday.

Eichstaedt, who Monday qualified for the National Open, grabbed a two-stroke lead in the individual race involving 133 golfers. In all 27 teams are competing over the par -72, 7,039-yard Miami Lakes course.

Eichstaedt's opening score led with Miami-Dade team to a nine-shot lead over another Florida junior college, St. Johns River of Palatka. Ray Isbell of Florida's Broward Junior College and Larry Lumpkin of Odessa, Tex., shot 74s.

Defending champion Jerry Smith of Odessa's 1965 winning team tied for fourth with five others at 75.

Louisburg Junior College (N.C.) tied an eight-place tie in the team race at 329. Louisburg finished fifth last year. The other North Carolina entry, Wingate, was far back at 356.

Paul McRae of Louisburg led the Tar Heels with a 79. Only 23 in the entire field broke 80 as winds of 20 miles an hour swept the rain-soaked course.
