### **Board Ups Graduation** Requirements, Orders Construction At Bunn, Louisburg

The Franklin County Board of Education approved a recommendation by the principals of the county on requirements for high school promotions and graduations, in the regular monthly meeting held here Monday. The new action places into effect new regulations governing the number of units necessary for promotion in the high school grades and eliminates the practice of students taking more than one year's English at a time. It' heads all schools in the county system toward the eighteenunit requirement for graduation. Louisburg already requires eighteen unit for

graduation. The Board approved plans for the renovation of the Bunn gynmasium to include a new entrance, additional seating, renovations to the present dressing room facilities and other improvements. The bid by Clancey and Theys Construction Company was \$23, 500 and did not include heat, and dressing room improve-

The Board also ordered Supt. Warren Smith to proceed with the construction of four classrooms at the Louisburg elementary building. The four rooms had been left out of the original plans when money gave out in 1961 when the school was built.

In other actions, the Board acted to insure that parents of students participating in athletics understood the status of school insurance in cases of injuries by requiring that parents be notified prior to a student's participation. Regular school insurance, which is optional at the beginning of each school year for all students, covers athletes in activities other than varsity football.

#### Carnival Worker Escapes

icted in Recorder's Court here recently of assault on a fellow carnival worker, B.J. Mulkey 31, at the Franklin County Fair on October 6, has escaped from a Vance County prison where he was serving

18 months for the crime. Word has been received by Sheriff's officers here that he now being sought in the Springfield, Mass. area where he is charged with staboing his wife and perhaps one other person, leaving one or both in serious conditions.

Earl was charged here with assault with intent to kill in the shooting of Mulkey, who remains in critical condition in Duke Hospital. Tried on the lesser charge of assault, Earl would be required to stand trial again depending on the outcome of Mulkey's condition.

No word was given as to the details of the alleged stabbings or how Earl managed his escape, but a reliable source said he was assigned to a work-release section and just walked away.

## Local Voting Light As Nation Goes To Polls

predicted, moved to the polls in small numbers today in what has been locally, one of quietest elections in several years. Just before noon, reports from eight of the eleven precincts in the county, indicate that today's balloting will fall considerably short of the 6638 votes cast twb years ago in the General Elec-

Louisburg led with 300 votes cast at 11 a.m. today followed by Franklinton with 215. Cedar Rock seemingly was setting the pace as 109 of the 994 registered voters had cast their ballot by ll a.m. Voters in Dunn precinct had numbered 77, slightly above the 73 in Gold Mine precinct. Harris precinct recorded slightly over 50 votes round 11 a.m. and Sandy Creek had 52. Youngsville had counted 60 voters. Other precincts were not reported.

The latest figures disclose 11,827 registered voters in the county with a round 6600 balloting in any election being the top figure. In the May primary 6342 votes were counted

The main contests affecting Franklin County voters is the race for County Commissioner between Democratic incumbent Norwood Faulkner and Republican newcomer Willis Dupree. Some interest has been shown in the race
