## Hurricanes Down Southwood, 79-59

Louisburg College opened the 1966-67 basketball season with a rousing 79-59 victory over Southwood College Saturday, Nov. 19. This was the first game for both teams and also their first clash in the CavaMer-Tar Heel Conference.

Floyd Wingfield put Louisburg ahead 12-10 early in the first half and the Hurricanes never fell behind again. Louisburg led 33-21 at the half and outscored the Rams 46-38 in the second half.

Southwood pulled within 8 points at 54-46 with 8:30 left in the game but Louisburg quickly built up a 15 point margin and never lost it.

Floyd Wingfield, a 6'2" forward from Lynchburg, Va., led all scoring for the game with 16 points. Other scoring leaders for Louisburg were Ed McLamb with 15 and Joe Penland with 14.

Guard Dave Atkins and center Jim Powell led Southwood with 12 points each. Whittenton was the only other scorer in double figures with 10.

Louisburg outbounded Southwood 40-25. Tom Bell pulled down 12 for the 'Canes with help from Ed McLamb who had 10 rebounds. Jerry Strickland, with 6 rebounds, was high for Southwood.

Coach End Drake of Louisburg said it was, "a typical first game. We were ragged in spots. I was pleased with the effort of all the boys."

The entire Louisburg bench saw action except Roger Taylor from Nashville, N.C. Taylor is still recovering from a sprained ankle from last week.

Louisburg hosts Hargrave Military Academy, Ferrum College, and Wingate College in the fourth annual Thanksgiving Holiday Tournament, Friday and Saturday, November 25 and 26. Friday's first game will be between Ferrum and Wingate at seven o'clock with Louisburg meeting Hargrave in the second game.

Saturday's first game at seven o'clock will match first-round losers with the championship game to follow.
