

Floyd Wingfield put Louis-burg ahead 12-10 early in the first half and the Hurricanes never fell behind again. Louisburg led 33-21 at the half and outscored the Rams 46-38 in the second half. Southwood pulled within 8

points at 54-46 with 8:30 left in the game but Louisburg quickly built up a 15 point margin and never lost it.

Floyd Wingfield , a 6'2" forward from Lynchburg, Va., led all scoring for the game with 16 points. Other scoring leaders for Louisburg were Ed McLamb with 15 and Joe Penland with 14.
