Cotton Producers To Hold Two Votes

Franklin County cotton producers will be given an opportunity to participate in two very important cotton referendums by mail between December 5 and 9, 1966. Producers will be asked to cast their vote to determine if marketing quotas will be in effect on the 1967 cotton crop. A "yes" vote will mean that there will be diversion, price support payments, and price support loans for those who participate in the 1967 Domestic Allotment Program. If the referendum is defeated, there will be no quotas, no

diversion or price support payment and price support loans will be available at 50% of parity for those who plant within their allotment. Producers will also be asked to decide if they want to be assessed \$1.00 on each bale of cotton produced to be used for cotton research and promotion purposes. Ballots for both referendums will be mailed to all known eligible voters on Friday, December 2, 1966. Each producer receiving ballots are strongly urged to read carefully the instructions for the

preparation of ballots and return them to the county ASCS office not later than December 9, 1966. It is most important that the certification on the reverse side of the envelope addressed to the county office be signed in order that the marketing quota ballot can be counted. Producers having questions concerning the preparation and return of ballots should contact their local community ASC committee member or the County ASCS Office. The Secretary of Agriculture has announced that the 1967

national Quota on Flue-Cured tobacco will be 1126 million pounds. Tobacco producers can expect their farm's normal yield per acre to be slightly reduced because of the yield factor of .9316. Several producers visited the county office on November 28, 1966, and requested CAP agreements totalling approximately \$73,000. It appears now that funds will be limited and the county committee may not be able to approve all of the requests that are being accepted.

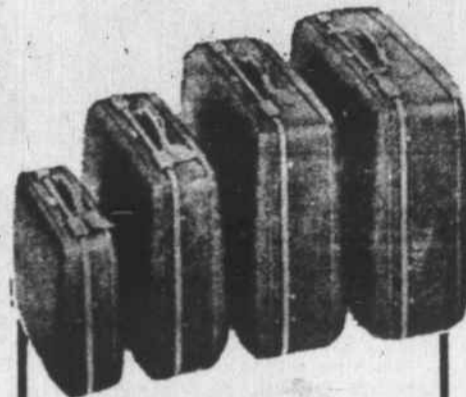
