Jacquelyn Driver, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. T. Driver, and member of Eagle Rock 4-H Club received the highest number of awards for individual participation. She was awarded a boiling water bath canner for the record submitted and the total amount of food canned.

Awards were given to boys and girls who participated in the various other activities. Tucker Meyer, English Runner-Up

Tucker Meyer of Louisburg High School has been cited as one of the outstanding students of high school English in the country. The National Council of Teachers of English has named her a 1966 national runner-up in its annual Achievement Awards competition.

Last spring Miss Meyer submitted original papers to, and underwent several hours of rigid analytical tests prepared by, NCTE for the Achievement Awards competition. From high schools in the 50 states, the District of Columbia, and American Preparatory Schools abroad, 800 finalists were chosen.

Finalists receive scrolls of recognition, and their names are sent to every college and university in the nation, as being recommended for 1967 scholarships.

The National Council of Teachers of English honors not only Tucker, but also the English department of Louisburg High School.

Dr. Robert J. Lacampagne, Director of NCTE Achievement Awards, wrote, in a letter to Tucker: "The National Council of Teachers of English extends its congratulations to you for your superior achievement in

English. It should be a source of pride to you that you have gained such facility in English . . . The papers and tests you submitted for the NCTE Achievement Awards competition reveal a high ability in writing and in the understanding of literature . . . The ability that you have shown in using your language should help you contribute richly to the success of your own pursuits and to the life of our nation."

In a letter to Mrs. Rena C. Bland, teacher of Junior and Senior English at Louisburg High School, NCTE Executive

Secretary James R. Squire stated that "entries were carefully judged by teams of prominent high school and college teachers across the nation. We are confident that these finalists represent the most able students in our nation today."

Mrs. Jewel C. Bartholomew, Freshman and Sophomore English, and Mrs. Rena C. Bland, Junior and Senior English, have been Tucker's English instructors at Louisburg High School. Tucker's mother is Mrs. Quin D. Meyer of Halifax Road.

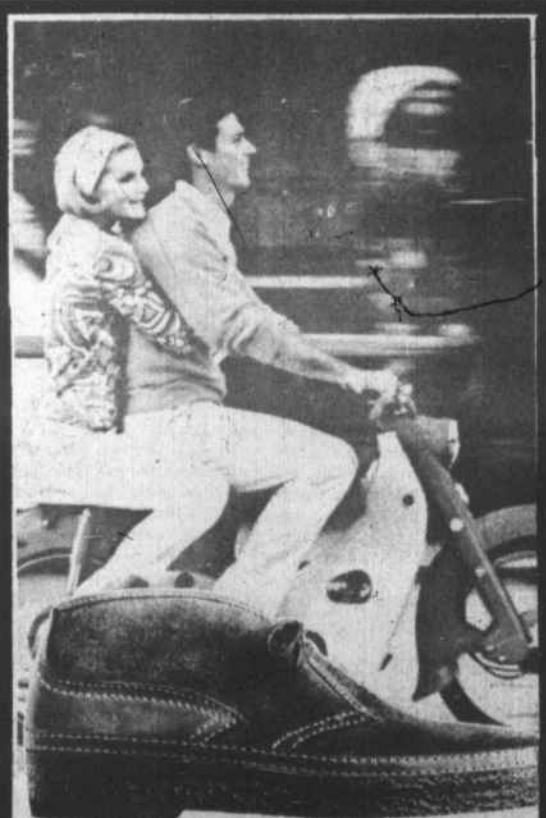
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
