Bankers To Be Honored

The Louisburg Hurricanes turned a tight battle with the East Carolina College freshmen into a 70-61 victory last night. ECC led most of the first half but never by more than seven points. The score was tied 28-28 at half time.

The score jumped back and forth at the start of the second half. Floyd Wingfield put Louisburg ahead 42-40 with 13:40 left and the 'canes never fell behind again. Wingfield proved to be the star of the game. He pumped in 18 points

and pulled down 13 rebounds. Pete Eyer was a real hawk on defense. Other leading scorers were Tom Bell with 13, Roger Taylor with 11, and Chris Stinson added 12 points.

Tom Miller led all scoring for ECC and the game with 22 points. Only three other players scored for the Pirates. Modlin poured in 21, Brafford with 15 and Stokes rounded out ECC's scoring 3. Coach Enid Drake was very well pleased with last night's

game. He said, "We did much better than in our last three games. We had a much better shooting percentage tonight. There was good team effort, especially off the boards." Louisburg was 26 for 57 for 46% from the floor and hit on 18 of 25 foul shots for 72%. This was a great improvement over the first six games.

Louisburg now has a 4-3 record. They were defeated by conference foe Mt. Olive Saturday night 74-68. The Hurricanes travel to Old Dominion College in Norfolk, Va. Friday and face the William and Mary frosh Saturday. The next home game for Louisburg will be Monday, December 12, against the N. C. State freshmen.
