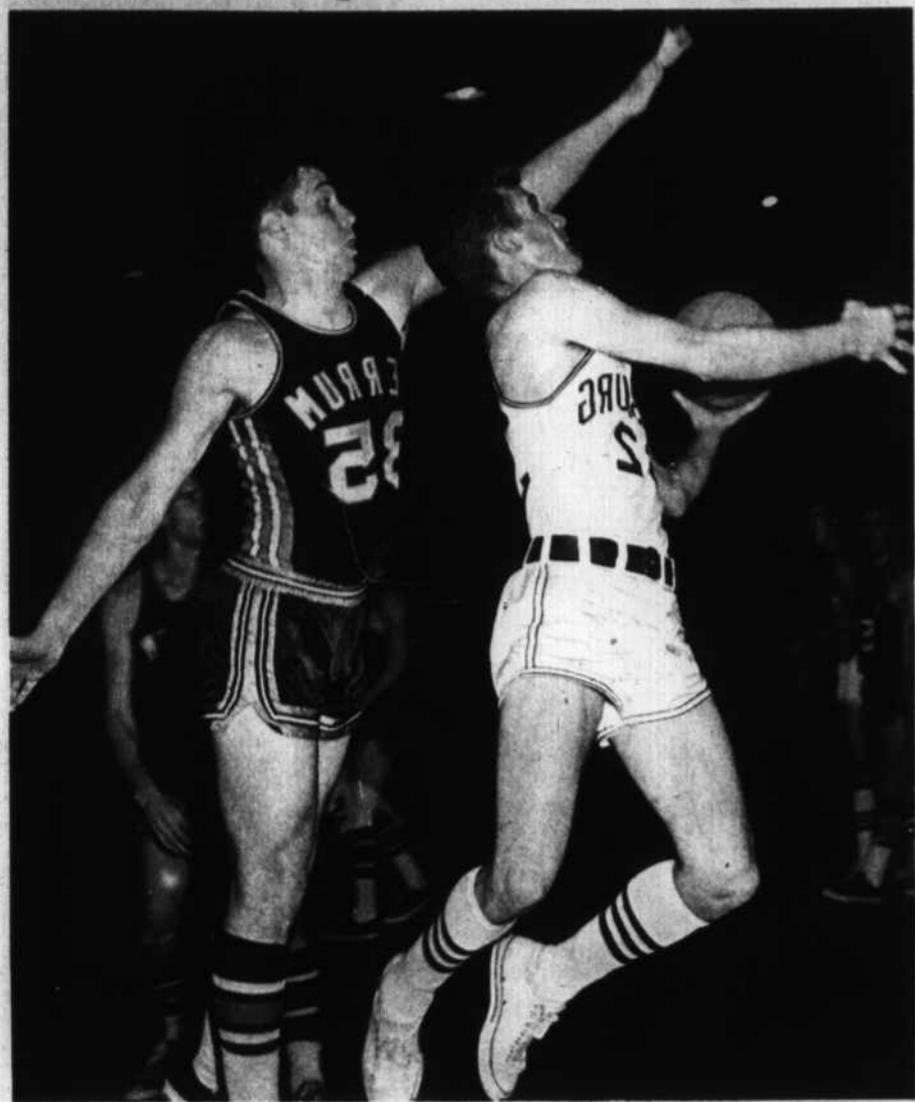


Ferrum Tops Louisburg For Conference Crown



Stinson Drives

Louisburg's Chris Stinson drives in for a shot, guarded by Ferrum's John Penn, in Tuesday night's championship game played at Louisburg College. Ferrum won, 65-59. Both teams will play in the District 10 playoffs at Lenoir, N. C. March 3-4.

The Louisburg College Hurricanes spotted the Ferrum Panthers a 20-4 lead in the early minutes of Tuesday night's championship game and never managed to come all the way back, although they made a gallant try before falling, 65-59.

Drawing an unusually cold hand in the first ten minutes of play, the Hurricanes could not master a most effective defense thrown at them by the first-ranked Ferrum Panthers.

The Hurricanes staged a late first half rally and roared back to a 28-24 halftime margin in the rousing cheers of a gym-filled partisan crowd. But, the second half started as did the first and the Canes fell back in the opening minutes of play.

With 5:45 time left, Louisburg pulled to a 50-47 mark but could never get closer than the three points. At 1:02 Chris Stinson again put the Canes within striking dis-

tance when his basket brought the score to 61-55. This was Louisburg's final threat as Ferrum held the six-point lead to finish with the 65-59 win.

Jerry Venable led the Panthers with 18 points and Joe Penland topped the Hurricanes with 18.

Both teams will compete in the District 10 playoffs to be played in Lenoir, N. C. March 3-4.

From the floor, Ferrum hit on 57 per cent of his shots while Louisburg connected on only 37 per cent. The rebounding battle was almost even with the champions pulling down 20 and the Hurricanes 28.

Louisburg College Dean John York presented the trophies immediately following the championship game, won by Ferrum 65-59.

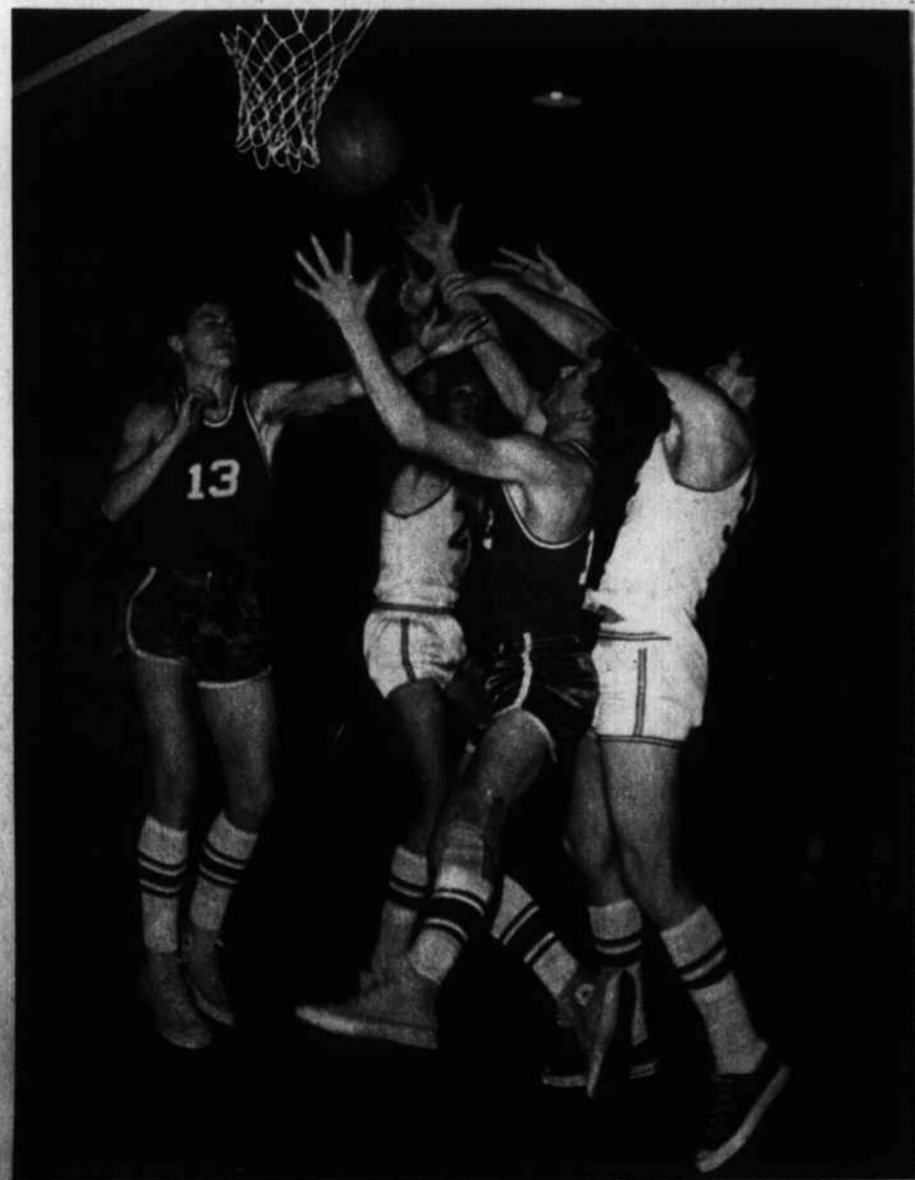
York presented the championship trophy to Ferrum Coach Jim Hartbarger and co-captains Mike Schanne and Robert Angel.



All Tourney Team

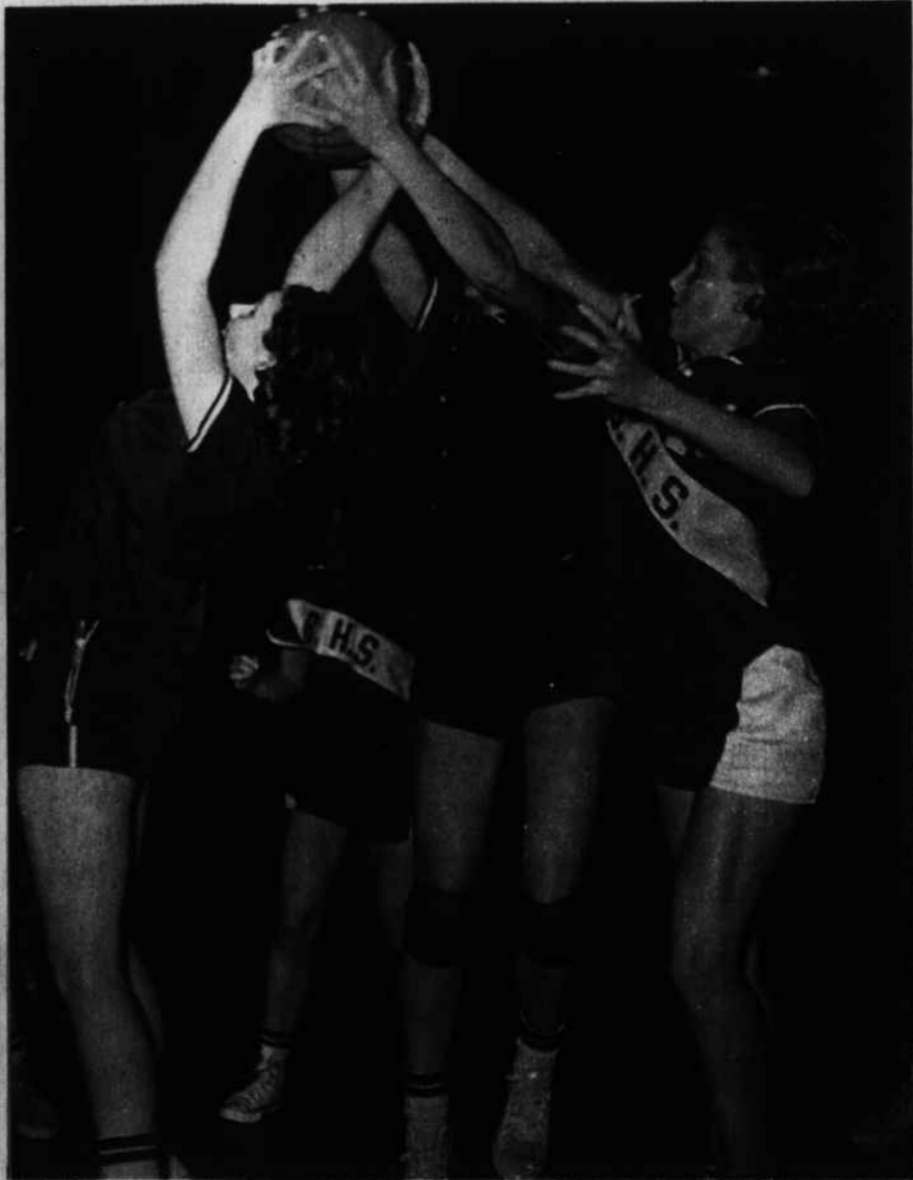

All Hands

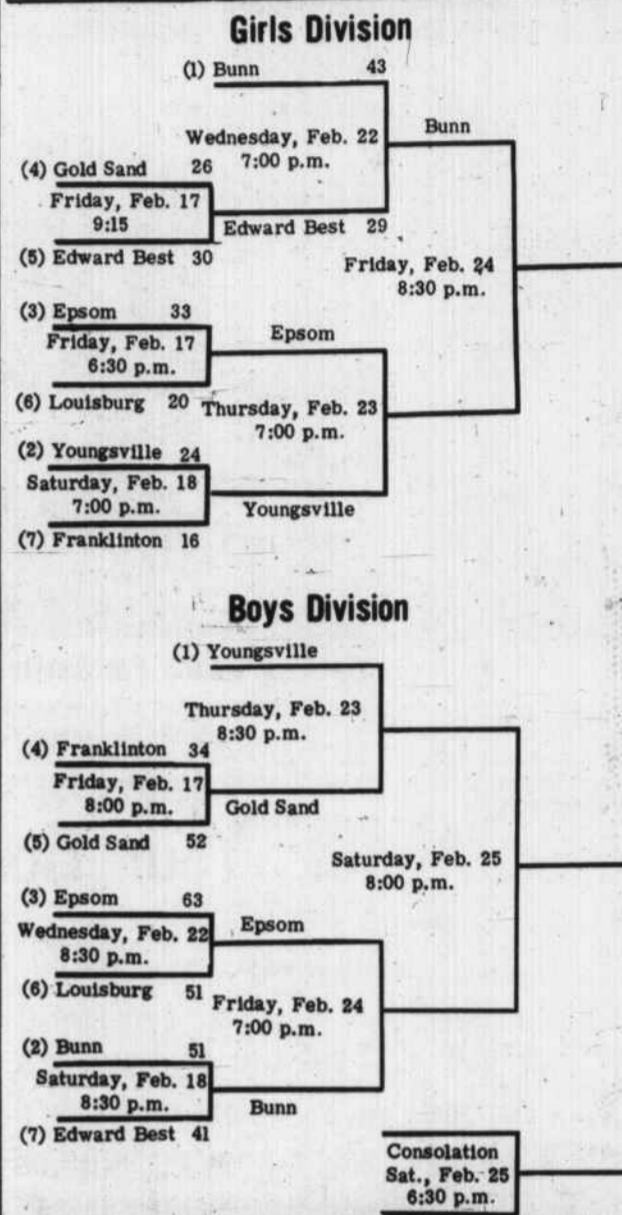
