Fruited Cake Picnic-Perfect

3/4 cup sifted flour	3/4 cup sugar
1 teaspoon baking powder	3 eggs, separated
1/2 teaspoon salt	1/2 teaspoon vanilla flavoring
1/4 cup chopped nuts	1/2 cup All-Bran (whole bran cereal)
1/2 cup finely cut pitted dates	
1/2 cup soft butter or margarine	3 tablespoons milk
	3 tablespoons orange juice
1/2 teaspoon cornstarch	1-1/2 tablespoons honey

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt; combine with nuts and dates. Blend butter and sugar. Add egg yolks, vanilla and All-Bran; beat well. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with milk, mixing well after each addition. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Fold into batter. Spread in greased and lightly floured 8 x 8-inch pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 deg. F.) about 40 minutes. Combine cornstarch, orange juice and honey. Pour over warm cake. Let stand until cold. Yield: 9 servings.
