Fitting a Pantdress

Is that new pantdress pattern you plan to buy short and sporty or long and loungy? Both styles are quick and easy to sew, but require careful fitting.

Purchase pantdress pattern in same size as your dress patterns. Because of pattern shape make all needed adjustments on pattern before cutting out fabric.

The vertical or lengthwise adjustments are most important. Specific instructions for measuring and adjusting crotch, back waist and finished length on a one piece pantdress (no waistline seam) follow.



First, use a ruler to meas ure your crotch length while seated on a hard chair. Tie a cord at your waist and meas ure from chair seat to point of ruler level with your waist line (Step 1).



Secondly, measure your back waist length, from prominent bone at base of neck to mended hem width. cord at waist. (Step 2). Then continue measuring down to desired finished length (Step 3). Record these measure-


