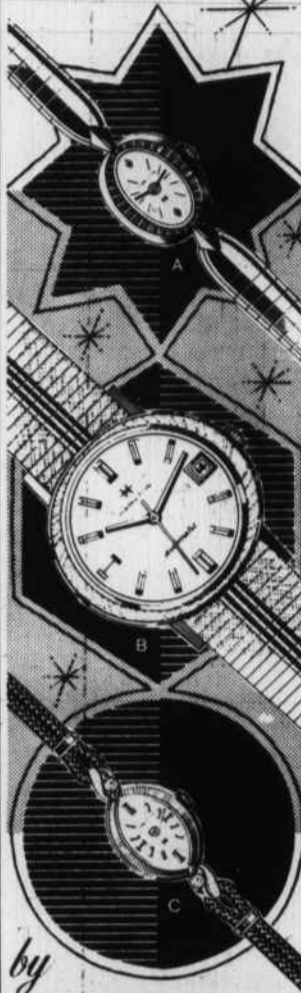
Rev. Herman Thomas of the Oak Grove Baptist Church presented the devotional which opened the meeting.
