#### RAISIN OATMEAL NUGGETS

Makes 3 dozen

- 3/4 cup shortening, soft
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1 egg
- 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon allspice
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 3/4 cup dairy sour cream
- 1 cup quick rolled oats, uncooked
- 3/4 cup raisins

Heat oven to moderate (350° F.). Beat shortening, sugars and egg together until creamy. Sift together flour, soda, salt, allspice and cinnamon. Add to creamed mixture alternately with sour cream, beginning and ending with the sifted dry ingredients. Stir in oats and raisins.

Drop by teaspoonfuls onto ungreased cooky sheets, about 2 inches apart. Bake in preheated oven (350° F.) about 20 minutes. Carefully remove cookies from cooky sheets with wide spatula.

She pointed out the advantages of its use and the changes people could expect. Mr. Harold Talton of First Citizens Bank and Mr. Frank Read of First Federal discussed the change of interest rates and some of the effects it could have on Franklin County and North Carolina.

Mrs. Harris encouraged those attending to pick up mimeographed material on banking that was available for their use.
