President Childers led in discussion on recent county activities of the County Unit; including plans for the annual Cancer Crusade to be conducted in April, services offered through Education Chairman Mrs. Grady Snyder, and services rendered through the Society to county cancer patient.

Citizens are reminded that individual aid is given to cancer patients according to the policy set forth by the American Cancer Society. Aid is available for prescription drugs, dressings, transportation for treatment and assistance for treatments such as radium. Funds are not available for doctor bills or hospital bills due to limited funds.

Attend State Convention

Evelyn S. Richards and J. Howard Conyers were in attendance at an annual State Convention for North Carolina Federal Crop Insurance personnel at the Blockade Runner Hotel, Wrightsville Beach, North Carolina, last week.

Among others attending the three-day meeting were State Director Julian Mann and Bud Forrest, Assistant to the State Director, from Raleigh.

Mann said the meeting was held "to train the personnel to give better service to present policy holders and to future policy holders." Representatives from 75 of the 100 counties of North Carolina, where some type of all-risk Crop Insurance protection is available, were present.

"The program is well received in the most western county of the State, Mitchell County, as far east as Beaufort County, and from the most southern to the northern part of the State," Mann said.

Over 30,000 people were guaranteed ninety million dollars in 1968 with nearly one and one half million dollars in claims paid for losses. Tobacco insureds received nearly one million dollars and one fourth million was paid for cotton losses. These claims were paid principally due to the record breaking heat and drought of last summer," he stated.

Federal Crop Insurance guarantees the investment on tobacco, cotton, peanuts, soybeans, corn, peaches, and apples should any destructive force of nature bring production below cost. The protection is offered in a limited number of counties except for tobacco and this insurance is available in most counties where tobacco is a main crop.
