Social Security Notice

It's report time again, Mr. Flynn district manager of the Raleigh social security office reminded social security beneficiaries today. "I am referring to the annual report of earnings that beneficiaries must file after the end of 1968 if they earned more than \$1,680.00," Mr. Flynn said. For most people this report is due by April 15, 1969.

Early this year annual report cards and return envelopes will be mailed to beneficiaries. If a card is not received or is lost, you can secure one from any social security office.

The people in the social security office will be glad to help fill out the forms. The beneficiary should bring his 1968 W-2 form if he worked for wages, or a copy of his 1968 Federal Income Tax Return if he was self-employed.

The report should not be filed by a beneficiary who earned less than \$1,680.00 in 1968.
