**Sgt. Norwood Returns After A Year In Vietnam**

Sgt. Willie L. Norwood, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Norwood of Arcola and the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Ayscue of the Gold

Sand Community, has returned home after a year of duty with the U. S. Army in the Republic of Vietnam.

Sgt. Norwood served with Company B., 2nd Battalion, 7th Cavalry of the 1st Air Cavalry Division. He worked as an infantry machine gunner and squad leader with the 3rd platoon of B Company.

The 21-year-old soldier received several awards during his service with the 1st Air Cavalry Division. Among these are two Bronze Medals. One was for a year of meritorious service as an infantry sky trooper, and other with a "V" representing valor for volunteering to go into an enemy held position to rescue a fellow comrade who had been wounded and unable to help himself.

Sgt. Norwood was presented two Purple Heart medals for wounds he received in action, and an Army Commendation Medal with "V" emblem for giving first aid to wounded comrades. He also received the Air Medal for participating in over 27 air assaults into hostile enemy territory.

The Warren County soldier saw action in two major operations of 1968. He served with his unit at Khe Sany in the relief of the Marines and later followed them into a Shau Valley, a major supply route for the enemy. Sgt. Norwood and his company worked in the area between the Quang Tri Province and the city of Hue for a long period of time. After his ninth month there, Sgt. Norwood made a move south with his unit about 45 miles northwest of Saigon, where he completed his year's service.

After a 30-day leave at home, Sgt. Norwood will be stationed at Fort Carson, Colo., where he will be an instructor until he completes his service with the U. S. Army.

**Livestock Show Is A Success**

Officials of the 24th Annual Durham Livestock Show and Sale were well pleased with this year's event held at the fairgrounds April 17 and 18.

With entries in the swine department up sharply from last year and steers maintaining their usual strong showing, an excellent offering was presented to the fine group of buyers assembled for the Friday evening auction which climaxes this two day event. Their support enabled swine to average above 22 cents a pound and steers 35 cents.

Franklin County 4-H'ers entered 10 steers and 12 market hogs with the steers grading 6 choice, 2 good and 2 standard. Swine exhibitors were Myra and Dan Harris, Justice, and Dexter Denton, Centerville.

Three Franklin County teams competed with 13 other teams in the livestock judging contest. A team consisting of James T. Boone, Stanley Nelms, Arthur Collie and Alton Smith tied for fourth place.

Other 4-H'ers competing in the judging contest were Bryant Foster, Marvin Richardson, Dexter Denton, Philip Sykes, Herman Hawkins, Wayman Williams and Hersey Carroll.

Bryant Foster, Martha Leonard and Herman Hawkins received recognition for their work in keeping records of their projects. Several local firms were on hand to support the sale with the two top county buyers being Jones Winston of Youngsville Milling Company and Harold Talton of First Citizens Bank.
