Beneath The Surface

For boatmen who want to get to the bottom of things, a modern antifouling paint combats barnacles and keeps boat bottoms completely free of growth. The paint, "Super Dripless No. 8," was introduced last year by the 103-year-old Chilton Paint Company of College Point, New York. The product was readily accepted by boat owners looking for something special in bottom protection. "To date," informs a company spokesman, "we have been called upon only twice to back our guarantee. A small percentage of boat owners will not apply the paint according to label directions. But we are receiving an encouraging number of letters from satisfied customers, praising the product's antifouling properties."

Seed Spring Lawns Early

Although fall is the perfect time to make new lawns, they can be made in spring if seeding is done early.

There are a few simple steps to follow when making a new lawn that will help insure the success of the project.

Always spade deeply when preparing the soil. The minimum depth is six inches. The soil should be pulverized and a humus material or sand, whichever is needed, worked into the soil.

For each one-hundred square feet of soil, work four pounds of plant food into the top two inches of soil several days before seeding is to be done.

Don't try to economize on the seed. If possible get information from the local agricultural bureau as to the recommended seed for the area.

Roll the lawn after it has been seeded.

Water daily with a fine spray until germination is complete. After the lawn has become established, keep it deep-rooted by soaking it thoroughly once each week. Daily light sprinklings are harmful because the grass roots come to the surface seeking water.

Feed the lawn twice yearly—in early spring and early fall.

Never cut grass shorter than one and a half inches.
