USS Kitty Hawk (FHTNC) - Seaman Apprentice Clarence N. Richards, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher Richards, Jr. of Route, Youngsville, N. C., is serving aboard the aircraft carrier USS Kitty Hawk off the coast of Vietnam.

While off Vietnam, planes from the Kitty Hawk help provide air support to U. S. and Allied ground forces fighting the enemy. In addition the planes also destroyed enemy targets in South Vietnam. Upon completion of flight operations the Kitty Hawk will return to Bremerton, Washington where she will undergo a yard period.

The carrier became the first ship to receive the Presidential Unit Citation during the Vietnam War.

## Phi Beta Lambda Receives National Recognition

The Louisburg College chapter of Phi Beta Lambda has just received word that it received recognition in three categories at the 18th National Leadership Conference, held at the Statler-Hilton Hotel in Dallas, Texas, June 14-17.

Merlette Bumpass of Roxboro, newly elected secretary of the Louisburg College Women's Council, and North Carolina State PBL representative for Miss Future Business Executive, was one of the top nine state representatives selected as the result of written examinations, applications, and other requirements to be interviewed by Dallas businessmen.

Miss Bumpass also received for the local chapter a Gold Seal Certificate award, won for a combination of considerations-annual program, projects, activities, service, participation at state and national conferences, businesslike manner and promptness of communication with state and national organizations, and recommendation of the state adviser.

The chapter received, too, an Honorable Mention rating on its Annual Activities Report. This was prepared by Barbara Brown of Durham, 1968-69 president of the Louisburg College PBL chapter, together with other chapter members.

There are 21 chapters of PBL now operating in two- and four-year colleges and universities in North Carolina; over 400, in 40 states, Canada, and the Canal Zone.
