Is the tomato a fruit or a vegetable to you? According to the dictionary and botanically it is a fruit. Among the fruits, the tomato is a berry being pulpy and containing one or more seeds that are not stones. Once one little boy spoke to me in concern when tomatoes were not discussed with vegetables for he had been growing them in his garden. Whether fruit, berry, or vegetable, Tar Heels enjoy tomatoes.

tomatoes. According to one of our men specialists, eastern Carolina tomatoes are best for canning and western are probably best for table use. If you have to shop for tomatoes, look for firm, well formed, plump, smooth fruit with good color. Allow under-ripe tomatoes to ripen indoors at cool room temperatures, but not on a hot sunny windowsill before placing in your refrigerator. The cold stops the ripening process thus only ripe tomatoes should be refrigerated.

Tomato-Egg Supper Dish

4 tablespoons butter
3 tablespoons flour
1½ cups milk
Salt and pepper
¼ cup shredded Cheddar cheese
6 hard-cooked eggs, sliced
3 large tomatoes, peeled and thickly sliced
3 cooked carrots, cut in strips
¼ cup fine cracker crumbs
Melt 3-tablespoons butter and blend in flour. Gradually add milk and cook, stirring, until thickened. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Put a tablespoonful of sauce in each of 4 individual casseroles. Put a tomato in each and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cover with remaining sauce. Bake in moderate oven (350 F.) about 25 minutes. Sprinkle with cheese. Makes 4 servings.

reserved tomatoes on top and sprinkle with crumbs. Dot with remaining butter. Bake in moderate oven (375 F) about 30 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

Tomato-Cheese Bake

2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons flour
1 cup milk
Salt and pepper
4 tomatoes, peeled
¼ cup shredded Cheddar cheese
Melt butter and blend in flour. Gradually add milk and cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Put a tablespoonful of sauce in each of 4 individual casseroles. Put a tomato in each and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cover with remaining sauce. Bake in moderate oven (350 F.) about 25 minutes. Sprinkle with cheese. Makes 4 servings.

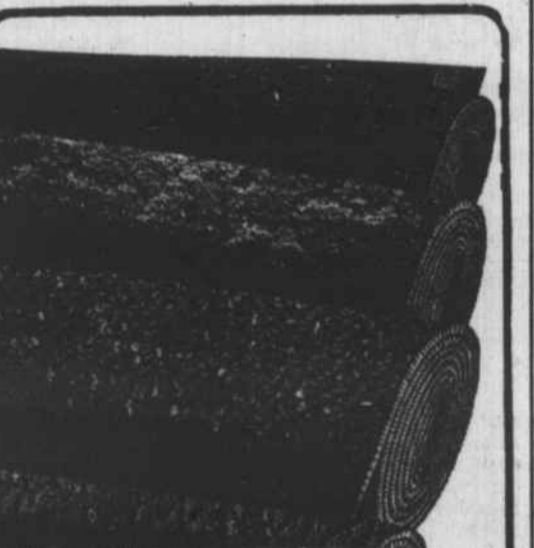
