Miss Linda Winston returned home Saturday after summer school in Strasburg, France, and tours in Germany, Switzerland, France and England.

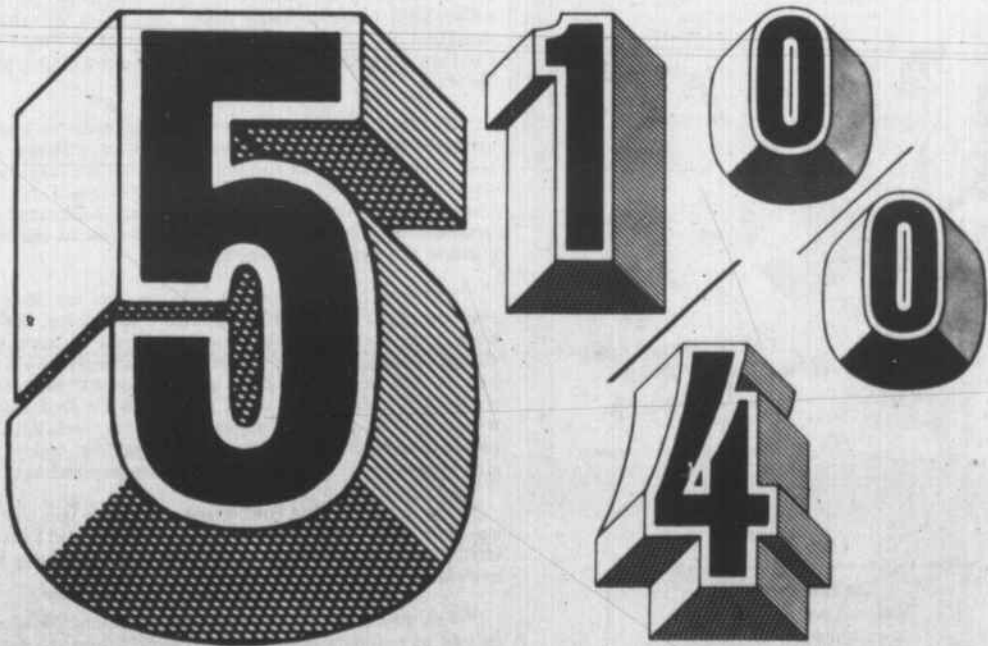

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Blueberry Meringue Cupcakes

BLUEBERRY MERINGUE CUPCAKES

- 1 1/4 cups enriched self-rising flour*
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup shortening
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 3 egg yolks
- 1 cup blueberries

Meringue Topping: Stir together flour and sugar. Blend in shortening and milk. Beat 2 minutes on medium speed of electric mixer or 300 strokes by hand. Blend in vanilla and egg yolks. Beat 2 more minutes. Fold in 1/4 cup blueberries. Fill paper-lined muffin cups 2/3 full. Bake in preheated 350° oven 15 minutes, or until done. Frost with Meringue Topping and sprinkle on remaining berries. Bake 8 minutes or until golden. Cool.

Meringue Topping: 3 egg whites 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar 6 tablespoons sugar

Beat egg whites with cream of tartar until foamy; gradually add sugar, beating until stiff peaks form.

*Spoon flour into dry measuring cup; level. Do not scoop.
