Pineapple Oatmeal Drops

- 14 cups sifted flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon soda 1/2 cup shortening 1 cup brown sugar, packed

- l teaspoon vanilla la teaspoons grated orange rind
- I cup well-drained crushed
- pineapple
 12 cup chopped walnuts
 or pecans
 1 cup chopped, mixed
 candied fruit
- 112 cups rolled oats, uncooked, quick or regular

Combine flour, salt and soda; sift into bowl. Beat shortening and sugar together until creamy. Add egg, vanilla and orange rind; beat well. Stir in pineapple, mixing well. Add sifted dry in gredients, ½ at a time, mixing well after each addition. Stir in nuts, fruit and oats and mix well. Drop level tablespoonfuls of dough onto lightly greased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (350 F.) until lightly browned. 12 to 15 minutes.

Yield: About 5½ dozen.


