LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES PASSED AT THE SECOND SESSION OF THE TWENTY-SIXTH CONGRESS.

[Public-No. 11.]

AN ACT making appropriations for the civil and diplomatic expenses of the Government for the year eighteen hundred and forty-one.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House America in Congress assembled, That lars; the following soms be, and the same are hereby, appropriated, to be paid out of any mappropriated money in the Treasury, lars;
