9. Closing Period, 15 minutes. Habit Talk, Mrs. W. J. Harris. Announcements. Dismissal.

### YOUNG NEGRO WINS HONORS.

The United States Veterans' Bureau is elated over the case of Solomon Harper, a young Negro electrical engineer and inventor of No. 666 St. Nicholas Avenue.

Harper, a disabled war veteran and with only an elementary education, entered on a course of training in electrical engineering at Columbia University and Pratt Institute, from which he graduated with the highest honors.

He has since been elected an associate member of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers, also qualifying as an assistant examiner of patents under the United States Civil Service and is now about to take an examination for a commission in the Officers' Reserve Corps, as well as entering the manufacturing field as an inventor.—The New York World.
