Our Governor.

We publish to-day a very brief report of Governor CALDWELL's masterly speech made in the City Hall Thursday night. We have not the space to give an entire verbatim report, and have therefore merely touched the various heads, without giving the entire arguments. We feel confident, however, that we print enough to convince any unprejudiced person that Governor CALDWELL is an honest man. As usual, here as elsewhere, the Governor's sound arguments are answered by abuse and contemptuous allusions. The Democratic press cannot successfully answer his logical points and masterly defense of himself and his administration. It is very nice to call him "Mar's Tod" and other epithets, too numerous to mention, but when the people of the State hear him speak, as we did on Thursday night, we are confident that the thunder of his big guns will forever silence in their minds the rattling sound of Democratic pigeon shot, as discharged by their papers. Governor CALDWELL'S address, was dignified, splendidly delivered and stamped him as an honest man who could not be intimidated. His arguments are unanswerable and cannot be sneered away. Even this morning we have a slight slur in the Journal of this city calling attention to the Governor's remarks about the militia, and answers it by mentioning an independent rifle company in this city. Will the editor please inform us under what law the Governor can call out that independent company to capture the outlaws or arrest Ku Klux? We would be rejoiced to find it, and then, the Governor who has seen no such act, can have all the troops he wants. By all means show us the law.

We would like to have our contemporary's answer to that legislative address, signed by over one hundred Democratic members, which the Governor refers to in his speech. Will the papers tell us something about that? Don't answer our questions by sarcasm and the cry of "State debt." That answer won't do for every point we make on the Democracy. If we talk of measuring composition by the letter "m," they cry "State debt." If we talk of the expense of the impeachment, they cry "State debt," and if we show that members of the Democratic party got a large majority of the bonds, they only cry "State debt." Now get up something new, gentlemen: come out and answer the arguments by arguments, if you have any, and give us the why and wherefores of your position. Abuse and malignity are not arguments, and that class of warfare is too distasteful to us to engage in, unless actually forced there. We like plain, fair statements and are willing to answer them, equally fair and plain. But don't stultify yourselves by abusing men whom you know to be honest and upright.

The Charlotte Democrat don't approve of taking Northern papers, and criticises its cotemporaries for having the magnanimity to advertise other publications for a consideration. We occasionally have met with conductors

GREELYGRAPHS.

The World asks, "Why does not the Tribune give a list of Republican journals of this State that support Mr. Greeley? For the simple reason that, excepting itself, there are none."

The Germans give no new signs of favor to Mr. Greeley. The majority of their leading organs, both Republican and Democratic, are emphatically against him. The Albany Journal says: "Every one of the prominent journalists who favored the Cincinnati convention would have declared in advance that the nomination of Mr. Greeley must be the ludicrous failure and defeat of the whole movement. Some of them did actually say it. Still when it came they were constrained by pride of opinion to applaud and to attempt to deny what they had said and thought before. And yet they claim to be, per excellence, the 'independent' journalists of the country."

A Boston letter to the Springfield Republican says: "Sober reflection, while it has checked the laugh over Mr. Greeley's nomination in this part of the country, has not, probably, added much to his solid strength among Republicans. The spectacle of the Irish Democrats enthusiastic for him, does not help the matter in the minds of these men either, for they 'belong to the other parish,' and are not considered as good political guides. On the whole, the signs now portend a chilly canvass in Massachusetts, instead of the hot and sharp one that the nomination of Mr. Adams would have brought."

(From the Volkfreund.) Out with it. It is now said that Greeley is about to publish a letter which, in its extraordinary liberal views, will astonish even the Democrats. Thus far we have known Greeley, as indeed he wished to be known, only as an extreme Protectionist, an implacable Democrat-later, and a Temperance fanatic. During the fourteen days that have elapsed since his nomination his eyes may have been opened: from a Saul he may have become a Paul. There are few Liberal Republicans, but many Democrats. Perhaps this fact has given him some new ideas; or perhaps he has got to be a Democrat, just as Grant four years ago suddenly turned Republican. But whatever it is that the deep solitude of his candidacy has evoked, he had better come out with it. It is time that the public should know it; for the lying is getting to be so fearful in the newspapers that we should like to have something from Mr. Greeley himself.
