**From Ohio.**  
CINCINNATI, June 20.  
The United States court to-day, in the case of the government against Fowler, Hill and Williams, gave a verdict for plaintiff for \$300,000, being the amount of tax and penalty sued for, as fraudulently withheld from the government by defendants when distilling spirits. The case of David Gibson, one of the defendants, was dismissed.

**From Washington.**  
WASHINGTON, D. C., June 20.  
STATE CONVENTIONS YESTERDAY.  
MARYLAND delegation is a unit for the Cincinnati platform and candidates.  
ALABAMA.—There is the largest convention ever held. The feeling is largely in favor of the Cincinnati candidates, but for a straight State and Congressional ticket.  
MINNESOTA.—Every indication shows an endorsement of Greeley and Brown.  
PENNSYLVANIA.—It is conceded at democratic headquarters that the delegates to the Baltimore convention will vote for Greeley.  
LOUISIANA.—No promise of a fusion with the Republican wing. Senator Kellogg will be the candidate for Governor of the Grant faction, and Pinchbeck of the other wing.  
ARKANSAS.—All the counties were represented. Greeley and Brown will be undoubtedly endorsed. The Liberal Republican Convention reaffirmed the Cincinnati platform and candidates.  
TEXAS.—The convention recognizes the Cincinnati movement as a commendable effort at reform. The motion to instruct the delegates to Baltimore to go for Greeley and Brown was adopted by a large majority.  
The great mail which left York last night, last heard from at Gray's Ferry. The Railroad officials withheld the details of detention.

**From New York.**  
NEW YORK, June 20.  
GENEVA ARBITRATION.  
The Geneva special says: "The result of Wednesday's sitting of the Board of Arbitration is of a most favorable character, and it is confidently believed that when the Tribunal meets again on the 26th ult., that success will be assured. It is believed that considerable progress has been made in solution of the question.  
The mechanics and laborers of Long Island city, struck yesterday for the eight hour system, and increase in wages, of six to ten cents an hour. It is denied that the Erie employees in Jersey city have struck. Considerable excitement prevails at Middletown, Orange Co.  
Great excitement over the death of a young lady, Miss Butler, from small pox. She contracted the disease while attending a patient afflicted with it, and was forced to remove to a ruined building in the out skirts of the town, where it seems she had no medical attendance. She was left to die and her body mutilated by animals which had free ingress to the building. The authorities paid a man to attend the girl, but do not know whether he did or not.  
Immense numbers of seventeen year locusts have appeared on Long Island.
