The Result. It is amusing to note the feverish anxiety exhibited by the Democratic press as the time for the Baltimore Convention approaches. That they are to stake their all on its action; and after that action abide zealously by its choice, is self-evident. Could a more despicable procedure be witnessed? A party large in its array of deep thinking and pseudo-patriotic leaders, pledging themselves and their constituents to a man and principles so utterly at variance with their previous political creed. GREELLEYISM may be a "new departure," acceptable to these long-suffering and down-trodden Machiavellians, and the golden sunrise of their millennium may already seem to tint the Eastern clouds, and fat offices, unlimited power, and Bourbon aristocracy reinstated throughout their country. But never was a greater mistake. These are the leaders. What of the people? As a generality, following rigidly the public exponents of their creeds; mere waifs on the sea of politics. We prophesy that when the stormy heights are scaled, they will look back over the troublesome way and view there the hopes of long years of waiting, scattered in the mire. While that few, the venturesome band of captains, who so blatantly bade them follow, turn against them, and bid them home till they need their aid again. This will be the inevitable result, and the pangs of defeat will in all probability be added to those of deeper degradation: the knowledge that the well laid plans, and principles falsely assumed, have retaliated with crushing force on the sources from whence they came. Scylla to Charybdis. The present attitude of the Democratic party, is a forcible exemplification

tion of the inelegant, but apt maxim, "Any port in a storm." After a noble struggle on the battlefield, and since, from the rostrum, the final acceptance of the silver-gilded pill of Greelleyism, proves how hollow were their actions. Siding with a few unprincipled, disappointed office-seekers, they strive to support and establish a policy ruinous in its every phase. The official actions of GEN. GRANT have been in the main acceptable to the masses, white and colored. Mistakes have occurred in every administration since that of Washington; and it is the duty of a wise government to correct these mistakes as they occur. President GRANT may have been led, through unwise influences, to give his sanction to seemingly unjust acts; but his prompt and just action repudiating the abuse cannot but be admired. Should HORACE GREELEY become President of the United States, an event not in the least probable, the South would particularly feel the pernicious influences of his administration. What a grand field for political experiment, would be afforded the learned Dr. He would treat it as a rare exotic; fertilize with exploded doctrines, irrigate with theoretical profundities, and one by one lop off the social and political branches already acquired, and giving golden promises of a perfect future. When he has watered, maundered, and pruned this beautiful tree of equal liberty, to his heart's content, it will be found the bare and barren stalk of '65.

Gen. GRANT's present and past policy has been one thoroughly on the side of justice to all, North and South. He was an honorable foe and is now a no less honorable ruler. During his coming term the South may hope for a permanent settlement of the pending questions before Congress. Amnesty particularly. A settlement that will prove acceptable to them in every respect. We call upon the honest portions of the democracy who have blindly followed their leaders through their vicissitudes during the past decade, to beware of the labyrinthian reef that threatens them from the other side, and carefully reflect before casting their ballots as their old leaders dictate.

THE Democratic Legislature gathered this State to enable them to carry as many Congressional Districts as possible. As there was a very large Republican majority in the eastern portion of the State, they succeeded in working in a long string of strong Republican Counties, and called it the Second District. The candidates are Judge THOMAS and Capt. KITCHEN, and the latter gentlemen, with no more chance of his being elected than he has of being struck by lightning, promises the colored people of that district, to donate to their schools three thousand dollars of his salary if elected. Now this is decidedly "thin." Let us hear from some of the Democratic candidates, where there is a chance of an election, and see if they will make the same offer. We don't expect any such promises, we frankly admit. Those, like Cumulative Suffrage are only adopted where there are Republican majorities.

The Great Joker in Fayetteville—Vance Attacked by Guthrie and Badly Damaged. FAYETTEVILLE, N. C. June 25th, 1872.

EVENING POST:—To-day the Imperial Joker and politician of North Carolina, Ex-Gov. Z. B. Vance, (by previous appointment,) met a large crowd of Conservatives in this place. The Governor spoke for two and one-half hours, and was replied to by Wm. A. Guthrie, Esq., in about the same time, with each, a short rejoinder.

Gov. Vance's speech like all his efforts, was replete with wit and oratory, at least, it was as good as his efforts usually are, but in no wise an improvement on his speeches of ten years ago. Vance's fort is in the application of some

witty, anecdote or hit. His arguments were in no wise new—it was simply the same old hash served to the people two years ago and which has become so stale that only a little spice in the way of wit renders it at all palatable. But the Governor's arrangements for a clean sweep and general run over of all Republicans was thwarted most successfully by our young and talented Guthrie. When it was whispered over the crowd that "Little Guthrie" was to reply, a general supply of indignation curled on the lips of the faithful. The idea of the "boy" Guthrie replying to the Giant Vance!

But pluck and talent combined, are valuable characteristics. Right valiently did the little lawyer ply his lash and sorely did the thick hide of the Joker feel it. I have heard many Democrats express their opinion that Guthrie "surprised them." Gov.
