KEEP BEFORE THE PEOPLE!

Gov. Caldwell and his friends gave the mechanics and laborers of this State the first lien law they ever had.

Judge Merrimon and his friends told the people of this State in 1868 that every vote for our present Constitution was a vote for negro supremacy. Was their assertion true?

Who told the people of Wake last summer that if the Convention was voted down they would have to pay fifty dollars tax on every thousand dollars' worth of property. Answer—Judge Merrimon.

It is urged by the Democratic organs that the law is to be enforced in State and municipal elections. This is done to make it more obnoxious, if that be possible, to their party.

When the rebellious Traitors are overwhelmed in the Field, and scattered like leaves before an angry wind, it must not be to return to Peaceful and

Contented Homes. They must find poverty at their fireplaces, and see privation in the anxious eyes of mothers and the faces of children.

"I hold our Government bound by its duty of protecting our citizens in their fundamental rights, to pass and enforce laws for the extirpation of the execrable ku klux conspiracy; and if it has not the power to do it, then I say our Government is no Government, but a sham. I therefore on every proper occasion advocated and justified the ku klux act. I hold it especially desirable for the South; and if it does not prove strong enough to effect its purpose, I hope it will be made stronger and stronger."

Remember.

Do not forget that while there is no National Democratic party, there is a State Democratic party, complete in its organization and working day and night for success! Are we sufficiently aware of our danger? Shall we be deceived with all the rignarole of Democratic charges of fraud and corruption; charges proved false over and over again, but still reiterated with the same earnestness? We hope not. Let our friends be wide awake, and labor hard, and the victory will again be ours. Every man must Register. Let committees be appointed in every Township, and a thorough canvass made to see that every man is Registered. Prepare lists and see that every registered vote is polled. Have committees at the polls to see that every man has the right ticket and deposits it in the proper box. Our enemies are vigilant and have surrounded the election laws with so many technicalities that it will require the most scrupulous care to prevent mistakes. See that the election committees are thoroughly posted and at their posts all day. With these precautions and a vigilant eye on the enemy, they will be defeated.

Congressman Beck Branded. We have already published a thorough airing of Congressman Beck's charge against the Republicans of North Carolina, but the Northern papers come to us laden with such pungent comments on that disreputable charge that we cannot refrain from again publishing a refutation of the slander.

This morning a letter is published from Marshal Carrow to Hon. J. B. Beck, which disposes of that falsehood. From this letter it appears Carrow has drawn from the United States Treasury during the last fifteen months \$214,271, all of which, except \$66,367 was drawn in 1871. In the same fifteen months Carrow has paid on account of the expenses of the Federal Courts in North Carolina \$223,819 for Spring Term, Fall and Winter Terms. Every dollar drawn has been certified by Hon. George W. Brooks, United States Judge for North Carolina, whose official conduct has never been questioned. The large expenses of the court are due to largely increased business, caused by the prosecution of the ku klux and the perpetrators of frauds upon internal revenue. In these cases, besides prisoners, thousands of witnesses have been transported to the place where the court was held, and subsisted there by the government, a large proportion of them being in the interest of prisoners. Carrow says Beck knew of all these facts when he charged that money had been drawn from the United States Treasury to be used here for election purposes. I may add that there is a general complaint here among the Republicans that there is no money for the legitimate expenses connected with election, and if Carrow had drawn any that complaint would not be heard.

A grand Republican ratification meeting was held at Portland, Maine, on Friday evening last. Dr. George B. Loring, of Massachusetts, was among the speakers, and in his remarks said: "The secret of Grant's popularity was that he had protected every man in his business all over the country, and it was the encouragement of labor that had caused the financial success of the Administration. There can be no despotism or centralization of power among a free people. Grant had always been faithful to every plank in the party platform, and meant that every honest man shall have a living and his vote counted."

Gen. Sherman has a way of putting things so as to make his points very clear. For instance, a World correspondent has just interviewed him at Geneva, and drawn him into politics a little. The General gave his views of the "situation" very tersely, but he covered the whole ground. He said: "The Democrats are in a position of difficulty. They present that party which has the least frankly accepted the results of our civil war, and I do not believe any party so circumstanced in sympathies will, in our generation at least, win the confidence of a majority of our people. The war had to be fought—it was inevitable. Once over we must all wish to see its members buried, but we cannot consent to have its work undone."

The New York World rightly says that Mr. Greeley, if elected by Democratic votes, cannot ignore the Democratic party in organizing his administration. Indeed he has said that he would not. How do the Republicans who have thought of supporting him as a Republican like this claim and this acknowledgment.

EDITORIAL BUDGET.

Gold rises slowly but surely since the nomination of Horace Greeley, it now stands at 114.

Heavy storms in Alabama and Louisiana have irreparably injured the crops. The loss is immense.

The Geneva Board of Arbitration are progressing splendidly. Quick work and definite results will be the order.

The lightning ignited a powder magazine at Fort Monarca in the Island of Cuba. Exploding the same and killing some of the garrison.

The resources of Australasia are being rapidly developed. Gold, silver and copper mines are being worked principally by English and American capitalists.

Miss Clara Louisa Kellogg, has achieved a grand triumph in London. During the rendition of "La Traviata" she was recalled five times. The London press are unanimous in their praise. of the America's noblest and sweetest songster.

It makes our hearts sad, to read of the defeat of that gallant Southern horse, Longfellow. Like the men who raised him, he was grit to the last, and with an inch and one half of solid steel driven into the frog of his hoof ran like a demon to the end.

Among the watering place arrivals we notice a number of North Carolinians, who have slipped from us and are enjoying the delights of sea bathing, cool drives, and relief from busy care. The season at the sea side and at Saratoga, has so far been one of rare enjoyment.

Boss Tweed's trial has at length begun. Stokes off the docket, New York needs some excitement, and the trial of the Tammany frauds, gives to them the desired excitement. How it will result is a matter of conjecture. Tweed, Sweeney & Co., deserve the utmost punishment of the law. We would like to bet that they go Scott free.

The trotting at Saratoga this season has been one of surprise to the regular hobbies of the turf. Horses that were sworn to win have been beaten. Longfellow has by accident gone back on himself, and the disconsolate multitude of betters have been decidedly taken in. It will teach a good lesson to these gypsies of the turf, who have heretofore been enabled by bribery and otherwise, to predict with certainty the results of important races.

A shooting affray has occurred in Egypt between Consul General George A. Butler, and Col. J. M. Reynolds, formerly of the Confederate service, and now in the service of the Khedive. From all we can learn both parties were equally to be blamed. Col. Reynolds was dangerously and it is believed fatally wounded. Political differences are supposed to be the cause of the affray. The Khedive with remarkable justice, has ordered under arrest, and cashiered the officers in his service who participated in any manner in the difficulty. A court marshal will be instituted when the true facts will be made public.

TANBARK.

Gratz Brown has had a severe attack of cholera morbus superinduced by cherries, and, perhaps, buttered watermelon. He has also been somewhat afflicted with a verbal looseness, in a very obstinate, if not incurable form.

"Two dollars a day and roast beef!" was the battle cry of the Democracy years ago. Their views have been modified by recent events, and this year they will be contented with "Greeley mush and buttered watermelon."

For one Republican who will vote for Greeley in Pennsylvania there will be ten Democrats who will vote for Grant, to say nothing of the number who will stay away from the polls on election day. Pennsylvania is just as sure for Grant as old Vermont, "the star that never sets."

The Albany Argus (N. Y.) referred to Greeley in the following choice terms before his nomination at Baltimore: "Look then at Greeley—a financial abolitionist, the bitter, vindictive, prospective partisan—who would make the people rich by increasing their taxes, and improve their morals by hunting them into jails." "Has Greeley changed, that they should swallow their words and play the syphiant to this incompetent adleplate?" "If Greeley is elected he never will be the controller of his own temper. He lies into a passion with every one who refuses to argue with him, or who will not vote for him. 'You lie, villain, you lie!' was his salutation to Bryant, of the New York Post. 'Don't speak to me, G—d—n you!' was his obligation to the poet Buggane in the Constitutional Convention. He who postolleteth his own temper is better than he who taketh a city or carryeth a State. But Greeley neither do the one nor the other."
