ATTEMPTED ESCAPE.—An attempt was made by some of the jail birds to break out of prison, but they were prevented by the vigilance of Sol. W. Nash, the jailor. LATEST BY TELEGRAPH.

From New York.
New York, Oct. 1.
The national reform democracy nominated John McCall for Mayor, and the working-men's association nominated Jas O'Brien.
A treaty between the United States and the German Empire for the exchange of postal orders goes into effect to-day.
A Washington despatch says that private advices from Japan report a crisis in public affairs which indicates the ascendancy of the old Japanese party over the reform and, for the present, prevent the spread of Western civilization in the empire.
Horace Capron, who went from Washington as commissioner of agriculture to Japan, has been discharged. Fessie Smith, who went to organize the law department, has also been discharged.

From Pennsylvania.
TITUSVILLE, Oct. 1.
The oil wells have generally stopped. In some instances the engines were burned and the wells plugged.
The Daily Evening Press of this city announces that there is fraudulent registration in Titusville of nearly 1000 names, and the Press intimates that this is part of a system of cotization which has been generally practiced throughout the oil region. The Press is an independent paper and does not change the proceeding upon either party. The registration is nearly double that of last year. There is to be a rigorous investigation commenced at once.
PHILADELPHIA, October 1.
The journeymen tailor's strike continues. They have assistance from other cities, and will doubtless secure their demands.

From Washington.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.
It is stated that the department has information that ex-Congressman Butler, Waldreich and Strogo, his assistants, are now in London under assumed names.

Black's Bridge.—The new bridge, connecting Point Caswell with Caintack is finished. It is one of the most substantial bridges in New Hanover County, and will prove, we have no doubt, of great advantage in facilitating the transportation of produce from a section of the country, heretofore almost unknown. The people in that section are very much rejoiced, and feel as if they belonged somewhere within the reach of a trading mart.
The new bridge is about 250 feet long and fourteen feet wide, and with a draw 30 feet wide for the passage of vessels. Its sides are protected by a substantial hand rail. Mr. R. G. Ross, of Wilmington is the contractor and builder.
It is in contemplation by the citizens of the neighborhood to have a formal opening and gala-day, in honor of the occasion of the opening of the new bridge, on some day to be hereafter designated, when the public will be invited to shake hands across the watery chasm, and drink some of the watery element, with a pine stick in it.
The people have named the bridge "A. R. Black's" bridge, as a compliment to the worthy representative of that section, on the Board of County Commissioners, who has always been fully alive to the wants and interests of the citizens of New Hanover.

Sheyock & Rowland, of St. Louis, Mo., a bale of cotton for exhibition at the great Cotton Fair, to open in that city October 3d. The premiums for cotton from North Carolina are very liberal—\$500 for the best bale, \$250 for the second, and \$100 for the third.
