The outrages proved are shocking to humanity; they admit of neither excuse or justification; they violate every obligation which law and nature imposes upon men; they show that the parties engaged were brutish, insensible to the obligations of humanity and religion. A large share of the manufacturing portion of this community as well as most of the laboring class, are Republicans. There are two Democratic and one Republican paper in the city, and yet we sometimes see merchants advertising in both Democratic papers and ignoring the Republican paper. That man says, almost as plainly as if it were printed in so many words, that he does not desire Republican patronage. Advertising is not a question of political strategy. It is simply an exhibition of business life and enterprise which wise men have made and reaped the benefits therefor. We do not claim that all merchants who do not advertise with us, are illiberal, nor do we wish it to be understood that we intimate that none but Republicans advertise with us.

The Raleigh News gives us a history of the J. Russell Jones transaction with Gen. Grant. The New York Tribune has lied and relied on this slander, only it placed the land near Galena, Illinois. The slander started with a statement that Mr. Jones had sold a tract of land near Galena for one dollar to the President, and had then received the mission to Belgium. This the President, and J. Russell Jones denied. Now, the News says that "Mr. Jones in consideration of the sum of one dollar donated to the President of the United States thirty-one acres of land in Chicago, worth many thousands of dollars."

EDITORIAL BUDGET. There is a report in circulation that Lord John Russell is preparing a review of the proceedings and award of the Geneva Board of Arbitration. The Rinderpest has appeared among the cattle in Lincolnshire, England, and much distress and anxiety will be the result. The mourning of the Prussian Court has been prolonged until the 20th of October on account of the death of the Princess Hohenlobe, the half-sister to Queen Victoria.

The vessel which has been reported wrecked on Tuskar Rock, on the 14th inst., was the bark Newcastle, Captain Wilkins, which cleared at Liverpool September 1st, for Savannah. Thirty of the crew were lost. The Arabduke Albrecht, Field Marshal and Inspector General of the Austrian army, whose death was reported some time since in the foreign capitals, continues to improve, and his recovery is looked for at an early day. Mr. J. C. Bancroft Davis, the agent of the United States before the late Alabama Claims Arbitration Tribunal in Geneva, sailed from Liverpool for New York Friday in the steamship Oceanic.

The Chambers of Commerce in several leading cities of England have adopted resolves congratulating Her Majesty's government on the happy termination of the Alabama arbitration, and copies of the resolves have been forwarded to the United States. The Portuguese government has received unsatisfactory advices from its new colonies on the African coast. Many of the colonists are discontented and threaten to return. The efforts to establish trade with the interior have not been successful.
