THANKSGIVING.
Proclamation by the President.
By the President of the United States of America:

A PROCLAMATION.
Whereas, the revolution of another year has again brought the time when it is usual to look back upon the past, and publicly thank the Almighty for His mercies and His blessings; and
Whereas, if any one people has more occasions than another for such thankfulness it is the citizens of the United States, whose government is their creature, subject to their behests, who have reserved to themselves ample civil and religious freedom and equality before the law, who during the last twelve months have enjoyed exemption from any grievous or general calamity, and to whom prosperity in agriculture, manufactures and commerce has been vouchsafed:
Therefore, by these considerations I recommend that on Thursday, the 28th day of November next, the people meet in their respective places of worship, and there make their acknowledgments to God for his kindness and bounty.
In witness whereof I hereunto set my hand and cause the seal of the United States to be affixed.
Done at the city of Washington, this 11th day of October, in the year of our Lord, 1872, and of the Independence of the United States the ninety-seventh.

Hates to Come Down.
The Raleigh News hates to come down, and we cannot say that we blame it therefor, but it had to be done. The News has copied the various slanders emanating from the New York Tribune office with such sublime confidence and verdant trustfulness that it got deceived a few times, that's all. We published Speaker Blaine's denial of the internal Credit Mobilier scandal long ago, but the Southern Press kept quiet as long as possible, and now they try to creep out through a small knot hole by saying it was Mr. Blaine's brother who got the stock. The facts are, and the News ought to know it, that the brother of the Congressman was not living in Maine, but on the line of this Road, and invested \$10,000 in stock nearly two years before Speaker Blaine was even nominated for Congress. Now what connection can this have with the charge that Speaker Blaine had received over a million dollars in stock of that Road? The fact is, the whole thing was a base fabrication, and having done its work is being grudgingly denied. To what great straits are the Democracy driven! Slanders innumerable and utterly without foundation have been manufactured and circulated without stint or conscience, by the Northern press, and piously copied and commented upon in the South. It did not have the desired effect however, and wherever Greeley appeared basely reiterating the atrocious falsehoods of his Tribune "which is not an organ," the Republican cause has gained ground.
In view of the absurdity of this charge, and of its perfect refutation by every gentleman whose name was on that list, and the Tribune proved of forgery in its publication, we ask if it is a fair political argument to strive to make capital out of the denial they are forced by public opinion to make. The following is the back down of the News:

"It turns out that 'Blaine, of Maine,' referred to in the list of names on Oakes Ames' letter to Mr. McComb, concerning the Credit Mobilier fraud, is not Speaker Blaine, but his brother, J. E. Blaine.

We published the retraction of the charge which the Tribune made, in our telegraphic columns.
Mr. Blaine, the Congressman, is entirely exonerated, but Mr. Blaine, the Congressman's brother, has become involved in the scandal.
From this it appears that the names are not mythical—that there is a "Blaine, of Maine," who answers to the description—and the fact that he happens to be a brother of the Congressman, while it exonerates the Speaker Blaine, does not at all weaken the suspicion against the other Congressmen named in the list.
Now, if Wilson, Boutwell, Dawes and others whose names appear on the list, should happen not to have brothers to bear the responsibility and lift the burdens from their shoulders, how unfortunate it would be!

THE Greeleyites in this State are much exercised over the aid and comfort given by Gen. Grant to his relatives. If he ignored them we would hear that he was cold hearted and had no love for any one. But no, they can't say that! He does love his relatives, and see what he has done for this one! How his heart strings must throb over the ties of consanguinity which bind them together! Will some of our brilliant Democratic papers tell us what this relationship is called in their sensitive hearts? Here it is! The great bugbear and sorrow of American hearts over tarnished honor! A man may repudiate his oath to support the Constitution of the United States and fight to destroy it and exclaim: "I have done no wickedness," but now, they sometimes so sensitive of our good name and fame, cannot vote for Grant. Here is the terrible accusation.
"E. C. David, husband of the third cousin of the President's wife, is special agent of the Post Office Department in Illinois and Iowa."
There now! It's all over with poor Grant. He is ruined, and the great and good Horace is anxious to sacrifice himself on the altar of his country to save her fair fame. Poor Democrats, ain't they hard up.

We have put up with this inconvenience a long time. We know Gen. Abbott could have got an appropriation for it, as he did for the harbor, but then he ain't of "our people" and of course ought not to represent them. We wonder how large an appropriation Vance could have secured two or three years ago for this new improvement if he had been in the Senate. Not much, we fancy, but then it wouldn't do not to provide for Vance.

EDITORIAL BUDGET.
—The funeral of the late William H. Seward was largely attended at Auburn, on the 14th. The remains were placed in St. Peter's church where the Episcopal service was read. In spite of the inclemency of the weather, an immense concourse of people were present from various parts of the United States.
—The Waterford Bank, New York, was robbed Monday night by a gang of nine robbers, who effected an entrance into the Cashier's house, bound and gagged the family and servants, and dragging the Cashier to the Bank, forced him, with pistols and knives, to disclose the combination of the keys and unlocked the vaults. They then took the contents, mostly special deposits, belonging to residents of the village, amounting to about \$500,000. The Bank lost about \$9,500 in currency. Great excitement exists in the community, but no clue as yet to the villains.
—From Indiana we learn that the

official vote of seventy-seven counties received at the office of the Secretary of State, with semi-official returns from the other eighteen counties, give T. A. Hendricks (democrat) for Governor, 894 majority; Leonidas Sexton (republican) for Lieutenant Governor, 1,313 majority; W. W. Curry (rep), for Secretary of State, 2,163; J. A. Weidmar (rep), for Auditor, 1,224 majority; J. B. Glover, (rep), for Treasurer, 1,520 majority; G. L. Orth, (rep), for Congress at large, 1,147 majority; William Williams, (rep), for Congress at large, 1,474 majority. The balance of the State ticket, except Superintendent of Public Instruction, is republican. For the latter office Milton B. Hopkins (dem.) is elected.
The Legislature, from the official returns, will stand fifty-four republicans to forty six democrats in the House, and twenty-seven republicans to twenty-three democrats in the Senate.
The official vote of the Ninth Congressional district elects Neff over Shanks (republican) by twenty-eight votes, but in one township in Adams county—Shanks' district—forty seven republican votes were thrown out on account of the words "Republican Ticket" being printed at the head of the ticket. If these votes are allowed Shanks will be elected by nineteen votes.
Both parties are preparing to renew the contest for the Presidential election.
