THANKSGIVING.

Proclamation by the President.
By the President of the United States of America:

A PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, the revolution of another year has again brought the time when it is usual to look back upon the past, and publicly thank the Almighty for His mercies and His blessings; and

Whereas, if any one people has more occasions than another for such thankfulness it is the citizens of the United States, whose government is their creature, subject to their behests, who have reserved to themselves ample civil and religious freedom and equality before the law, who during the last twelve months have enjoyed exemption from any grievous or general calamity, and to whom prosperity in agriculture, manufactures and commerce has been vouchsafed:

Therefore, by these considerations I recommend that on Thursday, the 28th day of November next, the people meet in their respective places of worship, and there make their acknowledgments to God for His kindness and bounty.

In witness whereof I herunto set my hand and cause the seal of the United States to be affixed.
Done at the city of Washington, this 11th day of October, in the year of our Lord, 1872, and of the Independence of the United States the ninety-seventh.

Our Fair.

The time is gradually approaching for our Agricultural Fair and extensive preparations are being made, to insure a perfect success. We have generally heard our farmers say after an inspection of the stock and products on exhibition "why I have better stock than that at home." We do earnestly hope that our Fair this year will witness an immense exhibition of the products of North Carolina, especially of this portion of the State. Every farmer who desires to improve his prospects or has liberality enough to wish his neighbors to produce good crops, should certainly resolve to contribute something to the success of the Fair. Almost the sole object of the organization is the improvement of Agriculture. The Wilmington merchants have acted with great liberality, and now let the farmers respond.

The great problem is, shall our Fairs be a success. We must have the co-operation of all the farmers to make it so, and these annual exhibitions are of much greater importance than our people seem to imagine.

Every variety of crop made in this section of the State should be exhibited. We are aware that mistakes occur and some persons are dissatisfied with the results, as a matter of course. It is morally impossible to please every one, but let the dissatisfied remember that they are laboring to build up the State, and their personal disappointment is no excuse for their absence at the next Fair. There are several matters we are not pleased with in the management of the organization, but that is no reason why we should oppose the movement. We believe its success to be of vital importance to the Cape Fear region and therefore we propose to advocate it with our whole heart.

To our Republican friends we urge a hearty support of the Fair. It is not a

political organization, and, although most of the leaders are opposed to us politically, we have every reason to believe that our friends are just as welcome as the bitterest secessionist who ever stalked about these streets. Let us then stand by the Cape Fear Agricultural Association and make the coming Fair the banner Fair of 1872.

The work is going bravely on. From all parts of the Union we read reports of organizations and speakers, and most of our own State is fully alive to the importance of the contest. Under our present organization, we have canvassers in each club. Now is the time for them to do their work. See that every Republican in your ward or township is registered, and on election day see that they all vote. The grandiloquent boasts of confidence in the Greeley movement are for effect, and will deceive but few. Let us go on as we have always heretofore done, without boasting or noise, but registering and voting, and, as heretofore, we shall carry the State by a handsome majority. Our duty lies perfectly plain before us. Drop all foolish minor differences, and labor night and day for the success of our glorious cause. The noble Western States, with their millions of German voters, give no uncertain sound. They are perfectly wide awake, and have not been in the least deceived by Carl Schurz's eloquence or Greeley's hypocrisy. They are satisfied to leave the affairs of the nation in its present safe hands, and we must extend our hands to them, in a fraternal clasp, with no bloody chasm to divide us.—North Carolina must be put right upon the record, and give the full Republican majority she knows how to poll.—All we ask is a fair election, and for our friends to do their duty by getting out every vote. The opposition are working harder, if possible, than they did at the State election, and we must not be one jot behind. Our party has done nobly so far, and with this great final effort, the liberties of the laboring people will be secured.

THE Asheville Citizen (Greeleyite) urges the Star of this city to keep its roosters out of sight. This is good advice. The Citizen's fear that the party in power will "maliciously appropriate them to their own good," is far-fetched, because the Star chickens are not "game."
