Freedom of the Press.

Our friend of the Battleboro Advance is out in a flaming article on the arrest of Dana, of the New York Sun on a charge of libel, and becomes quite excited over a matter it has miseonceived.

The Sun is well known to be the most malignant, and utterly unscrupt paper in New York, and its balmy love for the administration was turned to hatred when its editor failed to become Surveyor of the port of New York, or some similar office in the gift of the President. Hence his outrageous attacks on him. But the President has never lifted his finger or taken any steps towards silencing Dana, firmly relying upon the confidence the people have shown they have for him.

The arrest in question was for a libellous publication in relation to the af tairs of the District of Columbia and not at all connected with National af fairs, so that the rage of our cotemporary over the arrest, and gloating over the discomfiture of the administration is entirely gratuitous and far from the

Washington is situated in the District of Columbia and is, of course, the scat of the District, as well as of the Federal government, and the decision of Judge Blatchtord was not on the merits of the case, but only a discharge from arrest on the grounds of illegality. Should Dana show his face in Washington, he would have an opportunity to learn the difference between liberty and license.

Some of the State papers have spoken of Col. R. R. BRIDGERS as a "Railway king" and as opposed to the farming interests of this State in an unjust and utterly uncalled for manner. We are informed that Col. Smith refused Col. Bridgers the professional courtesy of allowing his car to run over his (Smith's) road, and that Col. B. and his friends were compelled to pay regular fare. For this breach of courtesy, Col. Smith is lauded and it is even intimated that he must be a member of the "Grange," while Col, Bridgers is derided in un-

kind terms. We are opposed to monopolies of all sorts, whether railway, banking or telegraphic, but at the same time, we are in favor of railways, banks and telegraphs. Opposition to monopolies is one thing, and political attacks upon prominent officials, employed by them, is quite avother. In our opposition to Railroad monopolies, do not let us forget the benefits derived from Railroads, and the services of such men as Col. Bridgers in their efforts to build up the State. Because the Weldon road is controlled by Northern capitalists, there is certainly no necessity of denouncing it as a monopoly. We could not exist without our railroads, and if people don't like the management of these roads now in operation, let them buy them or build others. There is room in this State for many more, and a charter is now in the possession of a company for a direct road from this city to Nortolk. The present Democratic Legislature granted enough charters for railroads we think, to convince any one, that lines in this State are not monopolies. This sort of talk is mostly chaff. We need railroads, and the more, the 四 ボード チメダイル better.

In regard to Col. BRIDGERS, we have merely to say that his efforts to aid the agricultural classes in Eastern North Carolina have been constant and very beneficial. 'Tis a pity we cannot say as much of some other Raitroad Presidents,

- The Western and Northern counties of England were visited by severe thunder storms Wednesday, causing great damage to property and crops.

- A collision between the inhabitants of Valencia and the republican troops in that city is apprehended. Desertions from the Government forces continue.

- A dispatch from Khiva says the decree issued by the Khan on the 24th ultimo, totally abelishing slavery throughout his dominions, provides that all persons held in bondage shall be made citizens or returned to their native countries.

- Baron Wolverton died Thursday His eldest son, George Grenfut Glyn, joint Secretary to the Treasury, and famous as a Parliamentary whip, will succeed to the beronetcy. It is probable that Thomas Brassey, member for Hastings, will become the whip in the House of Commons in place of Glyn, when the latter goes to the House of Lords.

- Advices received from Carlist sources state that the minority in the Cortes intend to leave Madrid and go to Carthagens, where they purpose establishing a separate Government. They are endeavoring to induce Senor Pi Y Margall to accompany them. From the same source it is learned that the insurgents at Carthagena have enlisted ten thousand men of different nationalities in their cause and increased their forced contributions upon the inhabitants to \$80,000. Col. Nazales left Madrid for the purpose of fomenting an insurrection in the province of Jaen. His arrest has been ordered by the Govern

WASHINGTON NOTES

The Comptroller of the Currency has authorized the organization of the First National Bank of Ottawans, Minnesota, with a capital of \$50,000.

Hon. C. G. Gilfillan, of Pennsylvania, was at the Treasury Department Thursday looking after the result of the examination of the notes burned by the ineane cashier, Anderson, at Lamberton's Bank, in Franklin, Pennsylvania, tew months since. Nearly all these notes have been identified by Treasurer Spinner's expects, and redeemed.

The United States steamer Nipsic has can ordered out of commission at New

Thursday afternoon a delegation of gentlemen from South Carolina, headed by General Kershaw, waited on Attornev General Williams to make an appeal in behalf of the ku klux now undergoing imprisonment at Albany, and those against whom charges are pending in the courts of that State. The delegation was presented by Hon. F. A. Sewyer, Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, when it was represented to the Attorney General that the ku klux organizations of South Carolina had all disbanded, that peace and contentment reigned throughout the State, and that it was the desire of the citizens generally that those now in prison be released, and that all prosecutions now pending against others in the courts there be dismissed. It was believed that such an act would inspire the people there with still greater confidence, and give them additional faith as to the good intentions of the President toward them. The Attorney General replied that he was sure that when the President should become satisfied that peace was existing in that State and that he could with propriety do so, he would begin with the least atrocious criminals and pardon them, as it was the wish of the Administration to deal as lemently as possible with the people of the South, and that every opportunity would be embraced to that end. In conclusion he assured the delegation that he would communicate their statements to the President, by whom he was satisfied they would be carefully considered. The committee departed, seemingly well pleased with the interview, and will now visit the President at Long Branch .- Chronicle,

July 17th, 1873. An Ordinance emcerning Hog Pens and Styes.

TITHEREAS, the health of the city requires the abatement of all subjects calculated to produce disease: And whereas, the noxious odors arising from hog pens and styes are highly injurious to the health and comfort of inhabitants of the thickly populated portion of the city; therefore the Board of Alderman do ordain: Section 1. That every person who shall eep any hog, pig, or swine of any sort in the keep any nog, pig, or swine of any sort in the limits of the city, within the space bounded on the North by Red Cross street; on the East by Sixth street; on the South by Castle street; and on the West by the River—shall pay a fine of one dollar for each hog or pig, for each and every day the same shall be kept within the space aforesaid, after ten days notice from the City Marshal to remove

Section 2. Any ordinance or parts thereof conflicting with the above are hereby re-The above ordinance was passed by the Board of Aldermen July 15th, 1873,
