GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

(Condensed from the Raleigh News.)
FORTY-EIGHTH DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.
SENATE.
TUESDAY, Feb. 5.

The Senate met at 11 o'clock, Lieut. Governor in the chair.

Message Received. From his Excellency, the Governor, transmitting an itemized account of the warrants issued by him for the use of the State Geologist, &c.

Introduction of Bills. By Mr. Seymour, a bill in regard to criminals. Referred.

Special Order. At 12 o'clock the bill to adjust the State debt was resumed as the special order.

The motion of Mr. Danham to reconsider the vote by which the amendment of Mr. Cowles to submit the question to the people, after a general discussion, prevailed by a vote of ayes 20, nays 19.

The vote then recurring on Mr. Cowles' amendment, the yeas and nays were called, and the amendment was adopted by a vote of ayes 24, nays 14.

Mr. Worth offered an amendment providing that two thirds of the amounts held by bondholders be presented before any part is paid. Adopted.

Mr. Morehead, of Guilford, moved to indefinitely postpone.

Mr. Dunham called the previous question, which, being sustained, the vote returned on the amendment of Mr. Todd, which was offered as a substitute, and providing that the Governor turn over to the creditors of the State all property, franchises of the State, &c.

The substitute failed.

The vote was then taken on the Worth bill as amended, which passed its second reading by a vote of yeas 26, to nays 16.

On motion of Mr. Worth, the third reading of the bill was made the special order for Thursday next at 12 o'clock.

The second special order was taken up at 1 o'clock, being the general election bill, which passed the House several days ago, and reported in full by our Reporter in that body.

The committee submitted an amendment requiring the Sheriffs to make the returns by registered letters instead of "by mail or otherwise," which was adopted.

Mr. Grandy moved to postpone the further consideration till Thursday at 11 o'clock, and the bill be printed with amendments offered by Messrs. Waring and Ellis, of Columbus. Failed.

Mr. Cowles offered an amendment, requiring every voter, when challenged, to prove by some reliable witness, that he is entitled by the law, &c., to vote. The yeas and nays were called, and the amendment was adopted by a strict party vote.

Mr. Eppes offered an amendment providing that any elector may vote at any precinct in his county, &c. Failed.

On the call for the previous question on the passage of the bill, Mr. Seymour moved to adjourn, upon which motion the yeas and nays were called and failed.

Mr. Hyman gave notice of an amendment.

The call of the previous question was sustained and the bill passed its second reading.

Adjourned.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. At 10:30 o'clock, Mr. Speaker Robinson called the House to order.

By Mr. Blythe, a bill to allow County Commissioners to contract for the construction of turnpikes. Referred.

By Mr. Carter, a bill in favor of the Institution for the Deaf and Dumb and Blind. Referred.

By Mr. Norment, a bill to amend the act amendatory of the charter of the town of Lumberton. Referred.

A message was received from the Senate transmitting the House resolution to raise a Joint Select committee, to examine the Calendar and report at what day the General Assembly can adjourn, so amended as to adjourn sine die on the 16th instant.
